Mistake of Missouri Republicans.

The Chicago Tribune, a republican newspaper, rises grandly above partisan prejudice in its characterization of the republicans of Missouri in opposing the election of Joseph W. Folk, democratic candidate for governor of that state.

The Tribune says: "The republican state convention of Missouri deliberately sinned against the light when it made a party nomination for the governorship and refused to endorse Joseph W. Folk. It showed its indifference to a great moral issue and its ignorance of practical politics. What the convention should have done was to endorse Folk not as a democrat but as an anti-boodler and to nominate men for the other state offices."

The Tribune is right, though it is perhaps too much to expect that politicians should have followed such advice.

"Boodler" is the overhanging issue in Missouri. By the side of that issue partyism sinks into insignificance.

And now it is hinted that the leaders of the republicans will enter into "friendly arrangements" for the barter of votes with the boodler politicians of the state—notably in St. Louis—whose hatred of Folk will lead them to bolt him at the polls.

If the republicans sinned against the light in neglecting to endorse Folk they are committing a crime against decency in trying to knife him by collusion with criminals.

The republican party of Missouri could better suffer a dozen defeats than to win a victory this year over Mr. Folk.

The Dull School Boy.

If that boy of yours, who is reported by his teachers to be dull in his school work, is bright enough about other things don't borrow trouble concerning him. He will come out all right.

There are plenty of instances of brilliant men who were slow in school. For instance: Who would suppose that witty, successful Dick Sheridan, one of England's brightest men, was a dullard when in school? More than that. His tutor told his mother that the boy was an incorrigible dunce.

And there was Robert Burns, the poet, always at the foot of the class, caring for nothing but sports. And Walter Scott, the novelist, of whom an Edinburgh professor said, "Dunce he is and duce he will always remain."

There are good reasons why some boys fail to make a good record in school.

The really bright boy may be pursuing a line of his own. He is studying outside the curriculum. His predilections sway him and he thinks of the things he wants to think about rather than of the things in the text book. Unconsciously he is educating himself. He is working out his individual problem single handed.

Or, it may be the teacher does not know how to elicit the boy's interest. He struggles along and is rated low. At the same time he may be picking up more than he is given credit for. He absorbs something from recitations. And it may be that he is getting a better grasp on the salient features of a subject than some of the book worms.

If the boy has a healthy body and a healthy mind, don't worry about him. The prize student who graduates with honors not infrequently makes a failure in after life.

When life's school opens for the boy who has been dull in school life he is often found to be a diligent and successful student.




