

ST. PAUL PRIEST DEFIES ARCHBISHOP IRELAND

REFUSES TO GO TO A NEW CHURCH AND IS SUSPENDED FROM HIS PRIESTLY FUNCTIONS.

ST. PAUL, Aug. 23.—The Catholic church of the diocese of St. Paul is rent with strife.

The trouble has been on since May 10, when Father P. J. Danahy, pastor of St. Stephens parish, Minneapolis, died. St. Stephens is the principal parish of Minneapolis.

Father John T. Harrison for 10 years past in charge of St. Joseph parish was idolized by his flock. Under his guidance, his parish rose from insignificance to be one of the wealthiest and greatest parishes of the west. Under his direction, the parish began the erection of a \$350,000 church. Over \$75,000 had been expended.

When Father Danahy died, Archbishop Ireland assigned Father Harrison to St. Stephens parish. Father Harrison's flock rebelled. The archbishop was determined, Father Harrison refused to go and was suspended from his pastorate and all priestly functions were taken from him.

Father Lawler, pastor of the cathedral, the largest St. Paul parish, was placed in temporary charge of the St. Joseph parish.

Then the archbishop sent a bomb shell into the camp of the adherents of Father Harrison by announcing that St. Joseph's parish would be wiped out and merged with the new cathedral. At the same time, the archbishop announced that St. Paul was to have the finest cathedral in America. It was to cost at least \$3,000,000. Word on St. Joseph's new building was ordered immediately suspended.

Daniel W. Lawler, former candidate for governor and one of the most influential politicians and churchmen of the west, was named as head of a committee to protest against Father Harrison's removal. The Catholics of the diocese divided into factions. Meetings were held, but the archbishop was firm.

Then came the visit of Cardinal Satolli. A grand reception was planned, and Lawler, who never before had missed a reception or event in St. Paul church affairs, was placed on the general reception committee.

Archbishop Ireland, seeing his name on the committee, told the committee in charge that either the archbishop's or Lawler's name must come off, as the archbishop could not serve with Lawler on the same committee. Lawler did not serve on the committee.

Cardinal Satolli took up the case informally, and Father Harrison is expected to go east within a few days to formally present his case to the Vatican's representatives.

Following the trouble comes the pulpit sermon of Father Printers, priest in charge of St. Peter Claver's Catholic parish (Anglo), directed against Archbishop Ireland.

"We need men to come to church more than we need new cathedrals," said Father Printers. "A great majority of the men on the committee named by Archbishop Ireland have not shadowed the doorstep of a church in years."

Other remarks of a pointed nature directed against the archbishop were made and Father Printers is expected a call from the archbishop.

D. W. Lawler, who is one of the big attorneys in the west, is preparing Father Harrison's case in legal shape and the papers will be formally forwarded to Cardinal Satolli.

WISCONSIN BANKERS

LA CROSSE, Wis., Aug. 23.—One hundred and fifty representative bankers and financiers were present this morning when the annual convention of the Wisconsin State Bankers' association was called to order. President John M. Holley delivered his annual address and the remainder of the forenoon was devoted to committee appointments, reports and other routine business. J. A. S. Pollard was the chief speaker at the afternoon session. Congressman John J. Esch will address the convention tomorrow and other addresses and papers will be presented by prominent financiers.

SILVER JUBILEE CONVENTION

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 23.—The American Microscopical society is holding its twenty-fifth or silver jubilee convention in this city where the society was first organized 25 years ago. Prominent scientists from many parts of the United States and Canada are in attendance. At the opening session today Mayor Knight welcomed the visitors on behalf of the city and T. Guilford Smith extended greeting to the Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences. The sessions will continue three days with Professor T. J. Burrill of Urbana, Ill., presiding.

HISTORIC SADDLE

Arthur A. PRINCESS CLEMENTINE OF BELGIUM, WHO LIKES TO BE CALLED AN OLD MAID, MAY WED PRINCE VICTOR NAPOLEON.



BRUSSELS, Aug. 23.—The marriage of Princess Clementine of Belgium and Prince Victor Napoleon is the latest court rumor. If the gossip prove true, they are as badly matched a pair as can be found in the royal lists of misfits.


The Princess Clementine is 32 and has rejected to be known as the old maid daughter of King Leopold. The tragic marriages of her sisters, the Princess Stephanie to the ill-fated Rudolf of Austria, and the luckless Louisa, who now languishes in a madhouse at the instigation of her husband, Philip of Saxe-Coburg, added to her mother's unhappy union, have taught her caution. She is extremely popular at the Belgian court, as the one member of the royal family worthy of admiration.

The Princess Clementine has managed to live in apparent peace with her father, although she was the warm champion of her mother's cause, and has tried in vain to aid her sisters. Only lately she has rebelled at an American favorite whom King Leopold has introduced at court. A marriage with Prince Victor Napoleon can hardly solve the difficulties of life for the Princess Clementine. He has already contracted a morganatic marriage, with which he is openly well pleased, and he has few personal attractions to offer.

Prince Victor Napoleon is 42. He is the son of Prince Jerome Napoleon and the Princess Clothilde of Savoy, a parvenue, according to aristocratic prejudice, on the one side and allied to the bluest blood in Europe on the other. He was born at the Palace Royal and baptized with great splendor at Notre Dame. But the present head of the Bonapartists is the despair of the party from his lack of energy and enthusiasm. His aunt, the Princess Mathilde, left the bulk of her fortune to his younger brother Louis in disgust at his indolence, and the Empress Eugenie is expected to follow her example.

LIBERIA'S NEW NEGRO PRESIDENT IS TRYING TO REFORM HIS COUNTRY

MONROVIA, Liberia, Aug. 23.—Liberia, now the only republic in Africa, recently inaugurated Thomas Barclay, its twentieth president. Like all his predecessors, he is a Negro, but unlike the majority of them he is a man of ability and modern ideas.

Barclay was born in Barbadoes and brought to Liberia in 1855, and as a boy sold in the streets. A few years ago he entered politics and as secretary of the treasury made an extraordinary record by keeping a balance on hand in real money.

Now, as president, he is endeavoring to improve the commerce of the country, bring its army and other public services to a state of efficiency and above all to keep on friendly terms with the native troops.

Today in Liberia there are only about 25,000 negroes who speak English and are emigrants or the descendants of emigrants from the civilized negroes of the United States. All the remainder, some 1,500,000, are savages. The American emigrants and their descendants have kept on top by their superior industry and intelligence, but the mass of barbarism about them threatens alternately to envelop them by war or to lower their standard of living by example.
