(For whom should the young American, voting for the first time, cast his ballot for president? With what party should he ally himself?
These questions have been answered by six men of national repute. Secretary Shaw answers for the Republicans; National Chairman Taggart for the Democrats; President Candidates Debs, Swallow and Watson for the socialists, prohibitionists and populists; while J. Lincoln Steffens makes reply as a young man who has made national fame as a worker in the cause of good government and true citizenship.—Ed.)
A distinct advantage to the party I represent will accrue from having the young men of this nation, the first voters, understand the issues for which the people's party stands. The people's party never has been in power nationally, never had control of the government, never had opportunity to do that which it proposes a purpose to do, and our cry to the masses of our country is, "You have tried the republicans and you have tried the democrats; both parties verily relieve your burdens before the election; neither of them does anything for you after the election—Trust us awhile! Give the people's party a chance." We say this especially to the young man who is starting his career as an American citizen. We want him to study the question and let his decision be born of his own consciousness, with a thought of his bearing upon him and his ambition for success—and his patriotism.
The people I stand for have been the object of a cruel and relentless system of persecution in the form of ridicule, a weapon chosen by the lordly magnates of class legislation. Rather than take honest issue they have sneered and vilified. The editor with his pen, the artist with his brush, and the careless and unthinking millions of the money power early caught up the slogan of ridicule and our principles have been distorted beyond recognition, and our leaders caricatured until they seem monstrous.
I believe that if the principles of the people's party were as well understood as they are popularly misunderstood we would today have a populist president, a populist congress and populist organizations in every state which would win their share of victories.
Our party is chiefly composed of those who toil in the hundred different fields of industry and who have never lifted their voices to ask this government for anything save the honest administration of just laws. Individually they may be obscure, but in the mass they compose the life and strength of this nation, for they are the workers and producers in times of peace and the defenders of our country in time of war. I am proud to proclaim their creed.
We declare that public roads should be owned by the great American people. So long as private corporations use for private gain those franchises which are of a public nature and were granted to them for public purposes, there is sure to be the tyranny of the corporation. It is simply a question whether the rate of taxation will run the railroads or the railroads will run the government.
We are in favor of an income tax. Upon the ground occupied by Thomas Jefferson, we say that the larger the income the larger should be the rate of taxation on that income, to the end that vast accumulations should be discouraged and that the wealth of the country should always be in a process of distribution. No fairer tax can be imposed.
We supplement our stand for a graduated income tax with a demand that there be no tariff tax upon the necessities of life, which the poor must have in order to live.
Regarding the money question, we have always stood upon the quantitative theory, have opposed national banks and have said that the creation of money was a government function, never to be surrendered.
Instead of competition and conflict between labor and capital, there should be co-operation and concord.

Capital is not to be hated for itself; labor produced it; labor is always producing it.
The party which I have the honor to represent in this campaign is the only one which stands for Jeffersonian principles. It is the only one which wages war upon the principles of the republican party. It is the only one which plainly, distinctly and positively tells the people wherein it differs in essential principles from the party of Roosevelt.
No defeats can discourage us; no ridicule or abuse or misrepresentation can daunt us. From the passions and prejudices of today we appeal to the sober second thought of tomorrow. Looking neither to the right or the left, we march on, proud to do battle for the sacred principles of popular self-government.
We propose to restore the liberties of the people, the rule of the people, and the equality of all men before the law.
