

# HOW TO AVOID THE DANGEROUS GERMS

Water pure or water defiled was the subject of discussion at the dinner given last night at the Spokane club by F. Lewis Clark to influential business men of the city.

In his address to the guests Mr. Clark stated that the question of fire protection, reservoirs or quantity of water was not what he had in mind so much as the important question of purifying the water used for drinking purposes in the city.

"It will be but a matter of a few years when we will have to do something radical to purify the water supply of this city," said Mr. Clark. "I have a map that shows over 30 houses within 1000 feet of the river from which our water comes, while one outhouse is sufficient to poison all the water used here. The doctors say that an epidemic of typhoid at Post Falls would endanger the health of this whole city, because water running in a river does not purify itself in a few miles as is generally supposed."

"The development that is in store for the Spokane valley is well known. The irrigation companies already have movements on foot that will increase its population 6000 in a couple of years. There is also a great deal of talk of a sawmill going in the river above the city pumping station.

"I see three ways to save the situation. It is possible to filter water so as to purify it of disease germs. The city started to dig a well beside the river last year to make a natural filter. It was started too close to the stream and the spring freshet broke into it. At an expense of \$5000 a well could be dug 100 feet from the river, and even if it did not prove successful it would be a paying experiment because of the great cost of any other system.

"A system of artificial filters could be put in that would absolutely purify the water by running it through sand, but it would cost approximately \$200,000. The other recourse is to go to one of the distant lakes in the hills and put in a gravity system at a cost of about \$1,000,000."

The remarks of Mr. Clark served as a topic of discussion for some length of time. Among those who discussed the question were D. L. Huntington, Dr. H. S. Martin, Otto Weile and Judge Turner.

Mr. Huntington pointed out that at the rate of increase in population in the past there would be 110,000 people here within the next 10 years.

Dr. Martin stated that all his tests of the water had failed to show disease germs notwithstanding the reckless manner in which the water supply was handled. It did not argue, he said, that the water will not be infected and he pointed out that the city was hovering over a dynamite magazine.

Otto Weile offered the suggestion that Spirit Lake is the best source of safe water supply for the city

and the water could be tunneled through the hills and sent through pipes 28 miles to the city with a sand filtration.


