Mayor Frank Boyd is up in a tree. The mayor shinned the tree when the first gun of the Acuff-Spokesman-Review for the mayoralty was fired. And the mayor pulled the larkstring just as the gun was loaded.

A few facts about the sudden raid of the gamblers leaked out yesterday and today and the information is well backed up that the swearing to the warrants was the result of a political plot whereby Mayor Boyd is the victim.

Mr. Heyburn had been there the day before the public was given the information, but was told he would have to swear to the complaints. He hesitated at the time, but after the news of the open gambling had been published, returned to sign the complaints.

The connection between the Heyburn-Acuff deal and the sheriff's raid can be appreciated by Mayor Boyd who, with his chief of police, put up the bluff of closing the gambling dens and then allowed the representative of another candidate for mayor to spring the trap.

"I have asked the city editor and reporters of the morning paper twenty times to swear to the complaints in connection with games they visited," said Prosecuting Attorney Kimball, "but they refused. They will probably be willing witnesses now."

MCINTOSH TAKES TIME TO PLEAD

John C. McIntosh was arraigned before Judge Richardson this morning and was given the statutory time to plead to the charge of burglary.

McIntosh was given a six months' sentence at Lewiston, Idaho, last January and was brought to Spokane to serve out the term. On January 21 Judge Richardson sentenced him to one year at Walla Walla and he was released November 25 upon good behavior. He came to Spokane and enjoyed eight days of freedom when he again is behind the bars.

McIntosh has enough Indian blood in him to entitle him to a quarter section of land on the White Earth reservation in northern Minnesota, where he left a wife and three children, each of whom have 160 acres of the government land. He is divorced from his wife. A. J. McIntosh, government pine inspector of Minnesota, is an uncle of prisoner McIntosh and a man of prominence. The town of McIntosh was named for Inspector McIntosh.

DUFFY IS COMING

Carpenters for the first time in Spokane will have the pleasure of seeing their general secretary, Frank Duffy of Indianapolis, and First Vice President T. M. Guerin of Troy, N. Y. They will arrive here next Wednesday evening and hold an open meeting Thursday evening at the George Stone academy on Riverside avenue at 8 o'clock.

The district council, composed of Carpenters' local, No. 98, and Millworkers' union, No. 1066, have arranged for the meeting and invite all unions of other crafts to be present. These brothers are returning from the San Francisco meeting of the American Federation of Labor.

The Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners is the second largest labor organization connected with the American Federation of Labor, having close to 2000 locals in the United States, Canada, Hawaiian Islands and Porto Rico. Death and disability claims paid in October alone amounted to \$22,957.75, two members receiving payment from local No. 98.

The two locals, Nos. 98 and 1066, of this city have over 600 members in good standing. The district council is composed of members from both locals and is the ruling factor for Spokane.
