

COUNCIL CHARGES DECLARING GRAFTS HANDLEY UNDER FIRE AND IS ADMONISHED

Council Passes Resolution Declaring Against Employing Aliens in Place of Men of Family Who Have Lived in Spokane for Many Years and Are Owners of Homes and Are Taxpayers

WITNESSES TELL OF UNWARRANTED DISCHARGES

Councilman Snyder, Funk and Lindsley Favor Strong Measures Which Are Not Taken Owing to the Belief That the Council Cannot Order the Board of Public Works, but Can Only Advise or Correct--Men Who Went to Cascade Saloon to Get Jobs in Street Department and Men Who Were Discharged for No Cause Tell Their Stories--A. C. Burrows Heads Delegation of Twenty Workmen Who Are Present at Council Meeting

"Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Spokane; That it is the sense of this Council that the board of public works should employ only residents of the City of Spokane upon work coming under their supervision or direction."

Twenty protesting workmen who were thrown out of work on orders from Street Commissioner Handley, in order, it is alleged, to make room for strangers who apply for jobs at the Cascade saloon, were before the city council last night to protest against the injustice done them.

Councilman Funk started the ball to rolling by the introduction of a resolution to the effect that the board of public works be instructed to employ only citizens of Spokane on all work under its direction or control.

In presenting the resolution Councilman Funk said: "I have been informed that old residents of the city have lately been laid off from public work and their places filled by newcomers, strangers in the city."

Councilman Snyder urged the adoption of the resolution, stating he had received reliable information that strangers in the city were being preferred in the distribution of jobs on public works.

PSYCHOLOGICAL STUDY BY AN EXPERT OF THE GREAT CHADWICK CASE

Dr. Allan McLane Hamilton, One of the World's Greatest Alienists, Finds That the Woman Is an Instinctive Criminal, Who Was Not Aided by Hypnotism and Whose Conduct Shows No Suggestion of Insanity.

She is a magnificent Confidence Woman and the Product of the "High Finance" of the Day, He Declares--There Are Certain Signs of Degeneration--Mrs. Chadwick and Mme. Humbert Compared--Stole for the Gratification of vanity.
