

BISHOP M'INTURFF DESCRIBES COLONY

Dowie's Zion to be Outclassed by Western Leader of People's Church Who Will Be Supreme

Bishop McInturff has received an offer of a donation of \$50,000 for his new colony from J. H. Harris of Seattle.

Every real estate dealer in Washington and Oregon is trying to sell the bishop a tract of land. He now has more than 100 good offers to choose from.

Bishop McInturff said today: "We have our working plan all arranged and the different departments organized. The colony will be managed by a board of seven members of the church named by the bishop."

"There are to be departments of dairy, horticulture, cooking, school, poultry, fuel and lumber, merchandise, religion, housework and justice."

"All disputes between members will be settled by the department of justice and anyone refusing to abide by the decision of the judge will be expelled from the colony."

"The colony will manufacture all its own furniture and the members can have their choice."

OLIVE AVENUE BRIDGE TOO LIGHT FOR CARS

The Spokane Traction company is confronted with a new problem in reference to the proposed new line on East Olive avenue.

The company, in making application for the franchise, asked to cross the river on the bridge to be constructed by the city.

The board of public works awarded the contract for a bridge, Saturday, to be constructed immediately.

Should the council grant the franchise for the new road the Traction company will be compelled to build a new bridge, or enter into an agreement with the contractors to build a stronger structure than is called for by the present plans.
