CHEERING CROWDS GREET PRESIDENT

(Scripps News Association.) SOUTH MALESTER, I. T., April 5.—Short stops were made by the president at Wagoner, Muskogee, South McAlester and he made brief remarks in each town, reiterating the hope of a speedy statehood for the territory.

VINITA, I. T., April 5.—Twelve hundred people turned out here to see the president. The station was decked with bunting and flags. The president's salute was fired with aid of anvils and sticks of dynamite.

PARSONS, Kan., April 5.—The president's party arrived in this city at 7:36, four minutes ahead of time. He made a stop in Kansas only while the engines were changed. Fully 5000 people gathered at the station and cheered the president, who made a brief speech.

SITE FOR ARMORY SELECTED

Another site for the new armory has been selected by the armory commission and the Riverside site, so unscrupulously urged by the tall tower tribe, has been passed up for good.

The site selected is that at Second avenue and McClellan street, which extends back to Pacific avenue. The site was owned by F. A. Blackwell and is sold by him for \$10,000, Mr. Blackwell voluntarily donating \$200 for the building fund.

The building will be the full size of the lot. The drill floor will be 100 x150 feet. It will have the truss roof construction, so there will be no pillars on the floor. There will be no rooms over it, but over the other 42 feet there will be a second floor.

In the basement will be shower baths, a target range, a kitchen and storerooms. The seats and stage for public meetings will be removable. The building will have exits on the three streets it faces, Pacific avenue, McClellan street and Second avenue. It will cost approximately \$40,000.

SIXTY-SIX WITNESSES WERE CALLED

(Scripps News Association.) CHICAGO, April 5.—After a rest of three days the federal grand jury investigating the packing industry resumed its inquiry this morning. With the exception of the Sunday adjournments the jury will now proceed to the end of the investigation and will probably finish by May 15. Sixty-six witnesses were called this morning.

Johnson is now serving his second term, but is a candidate for re-election.

FATAL DUEL
