

# FROM THE SHADOW OF THE CROSS GEN. BOOTH APPEALS FOR HELP

### For the Sacred City of Jerusalem, the Great Commander of the Salvation Army Pleads for a Broader, Nobler Effort to Save Lost Souls.

I am in Jerusalem, at the very heart of the scenes forever hallowed by my Lord and Master's life, sufferings, and death. I have visited Bethlem, and in imagination I have listened to the anthems which the angels heralded the Savior's coming to our world. I have walked the streets once trodden by His sacred feet: I have stood on the brow of Mount Olivet and gazed with the deepest sympathy upon the piteous tears he wept over those who were about to shed His blood; and I have looked on the other places made memorable by their connection with the tragic incidents of His earthly career.

They have shown me the Pool of Siloam and the village of Bethany; while Nazareth, Jerico and the river Jordan lay in the distance. They have shown me the reputed site of the temple, of the place of the Master's betrayal, of the palace of Herod, and of the judgment hall, where Pilate condemned Him to die. And as I looked back into that hall I saw again the crown of thorns, the mocking robe, the mimic scepter, the cruel scourging, while down through the ages I seem to hear again the cries of the mob, "Crucify Him!"

### Another Bank Wrecked: Employes Speculated.

LORAIN, Ohio, April 5.—Another Ohio bank has been wrecked by the dishonesty of trusted officials and Ohio's long list of dishonest bankers has been swelled by the addition of three names. The Citizens Savings bank is the ruined institution. Until a few days ago no young men in the county stood higher in the public estimation than Cashier E. F. Kaneen, Assistant Cashier H. B. Walker and Chief Bookkeeper D. S. Walker.

The bank closed its doors March 31. The directors had found a shortage of \$90,000. The three men confessed that they had been speculating in wheat and stocks, had lost first their own money, then the bank's. It was the old, old story.

### MAY TEND TOWARD PEACE

LONDON, April 5.—Preparations for the departure of King Edward for Copenhagen tomorrow, where he and Queen Alexandra will take part as usual in the celebration of King Christian's birthday, have revived the reports that the gathering at the Danish capital may have an important bearing on the movement looking to the restoration of peace between Russia and Japan.
