PISTOL DUEL GROWS OUT OF AN ELECTION

HUNTINGTON, West Va., April 6.—In a pistol battle between policemen and deputy sheriffs, growing out of the municipal election today, 40 shots were fired. Roy Hill, policeman was shot in the abdomen. He may die. The following were wounded: Jeremiah Adkins, deputy sheriff;

Burt Hoston, policeman; Ennis Bayless, deputy sheriff. The excitement is intense and the streets are filled with people. Another outbreak is feared. Trouble is expected as the result of high political feeling. The police being democrats and the deputy sheriffs, republicans, from the rural districts.

STOTKO, CHIEF WITNESS AGAINST "ALASKA WIDOW"

Mrs. Georgia Antrim, the "Alaska Widow," as she was known in Spokane, has been located in Los Angeles. The woman who has been hunted for months by the Spokane police, who has been credited with buying off insurance executives and adjusters and who escaped the grasp of Detective McPhee in Seattle by a bare 10 minutes, is serving a sentence of 120 days in Los Angeles for shoplifting.

The woman was arrested there some weeks ago and her picture is published in The Detective, by Chief of Police Hammel, who asks for identification. Mrs. Antrim is wanted here on a charge of arson, she being suspected of having set fire to the house on Cannon Hill occupied by her and collecting \$1500 insurance for valuable furs alleged to have been burned.

The dramatic feature of the identification of her picture by Captain Covelty and Detective McPhee today against her here was the murdered policeman, Henry Stotko. Stotko lived next to the Antrim house and was persistent in working up the case which proved Mrs. Antrim to be guilty of arson and swindling, he having established the fact that there were no valuable furs in the house.

Prosecuting Attorney Barnhart will be consulted and if possible an officer will be sent to Los Angeles after the woman. In Los Angeles Mrs. Antrim gave the name of Mary McAllister and her occupation as a traveling saleswoman.

A BIG REWARD FOR CAPTURE OF MURDERERS

The funeral of Henry A. Stotko, the murdered policeman, shot by burglars who were attempting to blow the safe of H. J. Shinn & Co., will be held from the Stotko home, 1623 Eleventh avenue, at 1 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

One man told the police a day late that four men had been stopping at a cabin west of the city and the police rushed there to find no one. Another wild tip was that three men, with guns strapped to them, were loafing about the St. Joseph orphanage. The men were rounded up but had no guns.

The funeral will be attended by all of the policemen of the city with the exception of a few held on reserve at the station and on the crossings. Six officers will act as pallbearers and members of the fire department and city officials will attend.

Chief-of-Police Waller is sparing no pains to prosecute the search for the murderous gang and is busy now arranging to increase the money offered as a reward to a sum which will make it profitable to some one to betray the burglars.

As yet no clew to the identity of the burglars and assassin has been discovered by the police, although every effort is being made to run down the murderous band. The detectives are handicapped through not possessing any description or other clew to the burglars. All that the dead officer could tell, in his ante-mortem statement, was that there was four or five men in the gang, each apparently well dressed and each wearing a black mask. The search for the thugs has been made systematically and every lodging house in the city has been visited by the officers and the strangers rooming there, thoroughly investigated. But this search proved fruitless as the chase of alleged tips of suspicious looking characters.

In addition to the \$500 reward offered by Acting Mayor Boyd, Chief Waller will ask the county commissioners tomorrow to offer \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the murderers. The chief believes he can raise \$500 by subscription among the business men of the city and he will also ask Governor Mead to add \$500 to the reward on behalf of the state. This will make \$2000 reward money and will spur the officers of other cities to work on the case. No hope is entertained of catching the men in Spokane and the only chance left is for the police of other cities to strike the trail.

A LEADER IS WANTED WITH COIN

Colonel "Ed." Sanders is not chairman of the republican city central committee any more. The colonel resigned last night. When the hungry faithful ascertained beyond the shadow of a doubt that the hoops would remain on the tightly closed Sanders barrel they started a campaign against the chairman and were able to show that Sanders was using the central committee to further his own candidacy for mayor.

This was sufficiently strong to warrant the resignation of the majority candidate as chairman and the faithful are gleefully telling what the lack of the \$250 contribution to the campaign fund did for Colonel "Ed."

A meeting of the central committee will be held tonight when an effort will be made to elect Alonzo Murphy as chairman. Mr. Murphy is also a candidate for mayor.

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RAZORED HIMSELF

Edward W. Bruce, a carpenter living in the Gandy lodging house, 916 Sprague avenue, tried to commit suicide last night about 8 o'clock by cutting his throat with a razor. The attempt at death followed a disagreement and his wife, the latter being a clairvoyant. Bruce cut a deep gash in his throat and bled profusely for 20 minutes before receiving medical attention. He was removed to the Sacred Heart hospital and today is pronounced out of danger.

A. G. AVERY CHOSEN FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEYSHIP

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The appointment was announced today of George Avery of Spokane as United States district attorney and George K. Baker of Goldendale United States marshal for the eastern district of Washington.

Rumor was rife in the city last night that a wire had been received by a prominent attorney from Senator Piles, asking if he would accept the appointment, but diligent inquiry failed to reveal who the man was. This morning private advice from Washington stated A. G. Avery, of Post, Avery & Higgins, was the man chosen.

Furthermore, it will be remembered that Avery's name was prominently mentioned for United States district judge, along with Judge Whitson's, and his withdrawal from that race may have helped him to secure the appointment.

Mr. Avery is known as a close friend of Senator Piles. He was chairman of the dinner given the senator upon his last visit to Spokane and hearty in his praise of the newly elected senator. The firm of which he is a member represents the Sweeney interest, and this may have weighed in his favor. But above all things that weighed in Mr. Avery's favor, his friends state, was his experience, which was

J. B. Lindsley, the councilman, was the touted appointee for the office, but his inexperience and corporation record worked against him.

The police are inclined to the belief that the dead man was one of the witnesses in the case of Alviso Truchetti, who was placed on trial for murder this morning. When the case was called two witnesses, Dominic Rosario and Frank Cordello failed to appear. Search is being made for them.
