

LILIENTHAL, TOOL OF THE TALL TOWER, HAS NONE OF ROOSEVELT'S PRINCIPLES

His Record Reveals Him a Bulldozing Official, an Egotist, an Enemy of Labor—Once Arrested for Violating Laws He Forced Others to Obey—Now Assisting Acuff, Arch Enemy of Unionism Into the Mayoralty Chair.

Henry L. Lilienthal. Who is he? Lilienthal is the Spokesman-Review's stool pigeon candidate. Lilienthal is the man who, flattered by the offers of a job at \$150 a month, consented to be used by Nelson W. Durham and the water meter gang as a stalking horse for the candidacy of W. H. Acuff, who is the real candidate of the Spokesman-Review, the Washington Water Power company and the Pacific States Telephone company. Lilienthal is the man who served as city commissioner and who, in that position, did more to insult and offend reputable business men and taxpayers than the veriest strumpet who ever paraded the streets. He is the man who, because Sam Glasgow erected a small carrier at his mill which was a mechanical necessity, called that well liked business man to the city hall and abused him like a dog, using his official position to bully one of the most gentlemanly and easiest going men in business. Not one man in the city who is a friend of Mr. Glasgow can afford to tolerate the candidacy of Lilienthal, the stool pigeon of Nelson W. Durham. Lilienthal is the man whose arbitrary methods in the city hall occasioned the remark that, as mayor, "the crown of the czar of Russia would not make a collar for Lilienthal." Lilienthal has no party, no platform, no excuse for running except the treacherous intention of defeating Floyd Daggett and electing W. H. Acuff, the enemy of organized labor. Lilienthal poses as the friend of the laboring man. What did he ever do for unionism? What isn't he doing now to help elect the avowed foe of unionism? If Henry L. Lilienthal is a friend of unionism why doesn't he not put the union label on the dodgers and other campaign printed matter which is being paid for by the Spokesman-Review-Acuff party? If Lilienthal is a friend of the workingman, let him explain this characteristic trickery in money matters toward a workingman: April 4, Lilienthal sent one of his men, Jess Lane, to William Huggard to hire a wagon to be used for Lilienthal on contract work at the rate of 25 cents a day. That wagon was used 22 days. When Huggard went to Lilienthal last week to get his pay, amounting to \$5.50, Lilienthal offered Huggard a dollar. Huggard refused to accept the dole. He went back to Lane and after some trouble Lane paid Huggard \$3. Lane told Huggard he would have to get the other \$2.50 out of Lilienthal—if he could. Mr. Huggard has not been paid. This is but one of the instances in which Henry L. Lilienthal has shown himself to be an unsafe man for the workingman to deal with. Lilienthal boasts that he made people put in sidewalks. He does not boast of the time last summer when he was caught cheating the city and his customer in putting down a brick sidewalk on North Monroe street. Lilienthal, although knowing better, ordered the brick laid without conforming to the requirements of the street department or put sand as the top layer in order to hold the brick and prevent the sidewalk from becoming uneven. When Major Gwydir, sidewalk inspector, visited the job he told Lilienthal that the work could not be laid that way. Lilienthal blustered and threatened the venerable, gray-haired inspector and dared him to make an arrest. Major Gwydir is an old confederate officer. Despite his age he has the courage of the rough riding southern gentleman. HE TRIED TO CHEAT BY PUTTING DOWN AN INFERIOR WALK, THUS SAVING THE MISERABLE PITANCE THE SAND WOULD COST! Lilienthal blustered and tried to bluff the two officials. But they would not be bluffed and Lilienthal was held under arrest until he agreed to conform to the law and do justice to his customer. A man who would be guilty of such

petty crookedness is not the kind of a man to enjoy the confidence of the workingman or the taxpayer. Lilienthal's stool pigeon candidacy can not be too strongly impressed upon the voters who do not want to vote for Acuff and who are being urged to vote for Lilienthal instead. This comprises the WHOLE STOOL PIGEON SCHEME. He is the stool pigeon of Durham and Acuff and his vanity is such that he declares himself THE MAN WHO GAVE BIRTH TO THE PRINCIPLES OF ROOSEVELT. This puffed up, swelled, pouter pigeon—Henry L. Lilienthal—does not see that his overweening vanity has disgusted the business men who might have supported him. "Me and Roosevelt!" Oh Lord! Can there be anything more sickening, more disgusting to the business man of Spokane than to have an obscure, vain, bull-headed sidewalk contractor and braggart pose as the father of "Roosevelt's principles?" Is there a laboring man in the city today who would believe for a minute there lay under that No. 6 Lilienthal hat anything which could be made to spell "R-O-O-S-E-V-E-L-T?" If Lilienthal can attract enough votes from the business men and taxpayers to cut down Floyd Daggett's majority, the Spokesman-Review-Acuff party think they have a show to defeat Mr. Daggett. The whole success of the scheme depends upon the number of votes their stool pigeon candidate can draw. They do not expect to see Lilienthal elected. If there was a show to elect the stool pigeon the Spokesman-Review would be the first to expose the crooked deal. Can you not see why the Spokesman-Review will violate its signed advertising contracts with Alex Winston when the latter tries to expose Lilienthal's relations with the tall tower organs and declares it will not print anything showing up Lilienthal or Acuff? If the plot behind the candidacy of Lilienthal is exposed to those readers the Spokesman-Review has befuddled they will at once declare against such political tricksters. Their votes will be lost to both Acuff and Lilienthal. No reasonable, intelligent business man or voter can fall to see the scheme behind the boosting of Lilienthal by the Spokesman-Review. Lilienthal merely obeys the orders of Acuff and Durham and Lund and poses as he is told to pose. If he were elected mayor—unless he betrayed the Spokesman-Review as he is betraying the democratic party which brought him into political being—HE WOULD OBEY THE ORDERS OF THE TALL TOWER AND THE WATER METER GANG WHOSE MONEY IS BEING USED TO DEFRAY HIS EXPENSES. As an example of how the Lilienthal supporters are becoming disgusted may be quoted the position taken by Edward E. Swanson, secretary of the Farmers' Grain & Supply company. Mr. Swanson originally signed the Lilienthal petition. When he found Lilienthal's candidacy to be nothing but a stool pigeon scheme to help Acuff he wrote a letter to Lilienthal, demanding that his name be taken off the petition, declaring his belief that Lilienthal could not be elected and that a vote for Lilienthal would mean a vote for Acuff. Mr. Swanson is but one of many who have withdrawn their support from the Durham-Acuff stool pigeon. Do not allow yourself or your neighbor to be fooled by the stool pigeon candidate. Do not vote for Lilienthal, thinking you will be voting for an honest man. No man is honest who has no party, no platform, nothing but an insane desire to rule or ruin—to be mayor or prevent the nominee of his own party taking that office. This is not the time for the honest voter to throw away his vote by voting for a stool pigeon used to cut down Floyd Daggett's majority. MANY KILLED IN FIGHT ON STREETS OF WARSAW (Scripps News Association.) WARSAW, Russia, May 1.—Cavalry and infantry this afternoon clashed with several thousand people marching in the streets carrying red flags. The horsemen used their sabres savagely, and the infantry fired several volleys. Many fell. The crowds scattered. Reports say 31 were killed and 15 wounded. Later the crowds reassembled near the scene and further bloodshed is imminent. Another collision of soldiers and workmen is reported in which the soldiers killed or wounded 20.

ALL COAST BREWERIES TIED UP BY BIG STRIKE SEATTLE, May 1.—All the breweries of the northwest were tied up by a strike at noon today, involving 2700 men—1400 in Seattle alone. The employers have asked the sheriff to supply deputies to be stationed at the breweries to prevent violence. The strike was caused by the breweries refusing employment to men named by the union in rotation. Breweries do not refuse to employ union men, but the unions declare there is a plan on foot to make the breweries "open shops."

BRILLIANT GATHERING AT GENERAL LEE'S FUNERAL WASHINGTON, May 1.—The funeral of General Fitzhugh Lee was held this morning in the Church of the Epiphany. A brilliant gathering of representatives and officials of the diplomatic circle came to pay their respects. Following the services, read by Rev. Randolph McKim, the remains were conveyed to the station with military escort. They will reach Richmond, Va., at 5 o'clock this afternoon, where they will lie in state at the city hall until Thursday, when interment takes place at Hollywood cemetery. There will be military ceremonies at Alexandria and Fredericksburg en route to Richmond.

"THE KING IS DEAD" retire from mayoralty campaigns. This is his last appearance. SULLIVAN, HERO OF MANY BATTLES, IS IN SPOKANE

"I can beat Mitchell. I know I can beat him. And I would like to have the chance to go against him." Spoke thus the mighty John L. Sullivan as he drew his eyebrows together and let out a monster breath to show that the "old man's" lungs were still doing their duty. Sullivan, his manager, Frank Hall, and his sparring partner, Jim McCormick, arrived here this morning and are quartered in a suite at the Spokane. There the former champion and world's greatest fighter met many friends and admirers during the day. There's a great change in the gray-haired giant before whom 143 men

have gone down to defeat. There's nothing to show that the Sullivan at the Spokane is the Sullivan who has chased the red globe across the mahogany to the detriment of the Sullivan physique. John is carrying weight for age. But he's still there with the ponderous arm, the awful fist and the belief that there's more than one punch left in the massive frame. His skin is as clear and healthy as a child's. His eye is bright and clear, his voice strong without a trace of the much talked of huskiness of the boozehunter, and every move, word and act shows a newer Sullivan—a man who is taking care of himself.

"What do you think of the chances of meeting Charley Mitchell on the coast?" was one of the questions which started the Boston man to going some. "Mitchell is heavier in proportion to his size than I am," said John L. proudly. "I have stripped to 269 when I started to get away from that 300 pounds. I am strong and never felt better in my life. Mitchell is not as well preserved as I am. I could go in and beat him today. All I've got to do is to get my mind into shape—and of course I've got to take off some of this—"

"STRIKE BREAKER" FARLEY NOW FIGHTING TEAMSTERS

(Scripps News Association.) CHICAGO, May 1.—May day opened on the third week of the teamsters' strike with premonitions of serious trouble in the streets. Yesterday's conferences of strike leaders developed no alternative but to continue the struggle to the bitter end, for no signs of conciliation was vouchsafed from the employers, who are relentlessly determined to destroy the teamsters' union. This morning 500 colored strike breakers arrived on a special from St. Louis. While passing the city hall the 11 caravan wagons of the Forbes Teaming company and the Sprague Warner company were assaulted by missiles and eggs filled with acid. The negro drivers drew black jacks and revolvers, but before they could fire all were arrested. The arrested men are imported strike breakers and arrived this morning. The president of the Chicago Federation of Labor called a meeting today of the joint strike

board, which aims to form a permanent offensive and defensive alliance to govern strikes. The meeting will be held tonight. Under the leadership of F. J. Conroy, the well known strike breaker, and guarded by 40 armed detectives, the imported negroes are sworn in as deputy United States marshals and paid \$2.50 a day to drive wagons. This is the element most likely to precipitate disorders. All the available strength of the police department, 1000 men, was thrown into the struggle this morning. Chief O'Neill says there will be no temporizing. Traffic must be unimpeded. Disorder must stop. The police will search all suspects for concealed weapons and make arrests in every case where they are found. Contempt proceedings will be begun today against those accused of violation of the federal injunction. The spread of the strike to the stockyards is expected today. Sergeant Richard Cummings

was run down by union teamsters Friday and died this morning. "Strike Breaker" Farley arrived from New York and is in conference with representatives of the employers. It is understood he will be placed in charge of all strike breakers. Farley won the subway strike in New York city and the railway strike in Chicago. Strike breakers who arrived from St. Louis were distributed to the barns of the Employers' Teaming company without being molested. A hundred strike breakers employed by the express companies went on strike this morning to enforce their demand for \$5 a day for drivers and \$4 for helpers. The increase was granted and the men returned to work. One hundred and thirty additional teamsters struck this morning, the largest body being employed by Durand & Kaspar, wholesale grocers. The men refused to deliver goods to the boycotted firms. Clarence Darrow has been retained to defend the

labor leaders indicted by the April grand jury. Thirty drivers of the Pattison Coal company joined the strikers today. Several shots were fired at negro strike breakers driving coal wagons to custom house place at noon. The negroes drew revolvers and fired at their assailants. All the nonunion drivers arrested today for carrying concealed weapons were released and went back to work. Lieutenant Halkins with 50 members of the Eighth Illinois national guard were placed on duty at the docks of the International Salt company this morning. The police made a descent upon the soldiers and took their guns away and arrested two who resisted. Louis Street, a colored nonunion driver for Marshall Field & Co. this afternoon, by shooting into a crowd following him, wounded John Neubauer in the thigh. Street barely escaped the vengeance of the crowd, through arrest.
