BIG STRIKE IN COLORADO

STRIKERS KILLED AT SAN JUAN

(Scripps News Association.) SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Aug. 2.—Serious rioting occurred here today in connection with the strike of longshoremen against the Porto Rico Steamship company. The police were called to quell the rioters and fired into the mob, killing two and wounding 40, some fatally.

WITTE CALLS JAP PEACE CONDITIONS INTOLERABLE

(Scripps News Association.) NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—"Japanese conditions are too intolerable to admit of discussion. I am happy to visit America, also am glad to have personal intercourse with President Roosevelt and to present the greetings of Emperor Nicholas," said Mr. Witte, Russian peace envoy, at midnight in an interview by wireless aboard the steamer Wilhelm Der Grosse 80 miles east of Nantucket.

NEW CABINET FOB SWEDEN

SEATTLE PRISONER TRIES TO BLOW UP COUNTY JAIL

(Scripps News Association.) SEATTLE, Aug. 2.—A desperate attempt to blow up the county jail was made early this morning by Jack Chesterfield, serving a sentence for criminal assault. His wife smuggled five sticks of dynamite and a revolver into his cell yesterday afternoon.

HOT WEATHER AGAINST YELLOW FEVER PATIENTS

(Scripps News Association.) NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 2.—Up to 10,300 today there have been two deaths and one new case reported to the board of health. The weather is against the patients—cloudy and sultry. All arrangements are completed to open a detention camp at the state line dividing Louisiana and Mississippi on the Louisville & Nashville road. It will be under the direction of the federal marine service. The health officials are investigating suspicious cases at Milneburg, a pleasure resort seven miles from New Orleans.
