PARALYTIC? NO!!! SO 'LJIE DOWIE POSES AND WRITES.

El Paso, Tex., Oct. 10.—The story that was printed all over the country a few days ago that John Alexander Dowie had been stricken with paralysis while en route to the new Zion City in Mexico, made that eccentric star of the religious world furiously angry.

When his private car Ranger reached here, a representative of the Newspaper Enterprise Association boarded the train and found Dr. Dowie in a mood very anxious to secure publicity that the "wrath of God" had not visited him.

In his most vehement manner he denounced the Associated Press, which sent out the report. He said it was something he never did, but so as to show the world that he was in good health he offered to go out to the car steps and pose for a picture.

After the photograph had been taken, he returned to his office in the Pullman and dictated to his private secretary, Fielding H. Willite, the accompanying article about his new Paradise city. When the statement had been put in writing, he signed it and delivered it to the N. E. A. representative, said it would be exclusive.

The article reveals the location of the new settlement, until now a secret.

By John Alexander Dowie. Written Especially for The Press. By the grace of God I intend to build up a great colony to His Glory in the rich state of Tamaulipas, Mexico.

Many thousands in all parts of the world are responding to Zion's call, having a mind to work, to sacrifice, and to co-operate. Zion City, Ill., the first center established, in the United States of America, has within four years become an object lesson to all the world. That city has proved the truth of its motto, "Where God rules, man prospers."

And now, in the fullness of time, there is offered an opportunity to secure a vast virgin domain in a sunny and healthful climate, rich in soil, in minerals, and in forests, and abounding in pure water.

The combination of these elements will bring great prosperity, and, through the principles for which Zion stands, will assure pure homes, careful and thorough education of the young, and the maintenance of peace, happiness, and the rule of God in the lives of the people.

Zion's proposed possessions in Mexico will eventually comprise at least 3,000,000 acres of land.

A large tract has already been optioned in the beautiful state of Tamaulipas. It is wondrously attractive in majestic mountains, beautiful valleys and streams, and is bordered by many miles of gulf coast.

More than 40 miles of the Mexican Central railway now runs through the proposed Zion paradise plantation, connecting it with the sea at the port of Tampico, a distance of about 45 miles, from whence great steamship lines lead to all parts of the world.

A Zion port will probably be established on the Tamesin river, connecting with a Zion city. This river is deep and navigable for seagoing vessels all the year round, flowing into the Panuco river above

effects of our people. It is expected that special excursions during the fall and winter months will be arranged through Zion's transportation department at very attractive rates. It will be found desirable for parties coming to Zion paradise plantation to bring their household goods and other personal effects.

Expert instructors will be engaged to teach scientific methods of growing the various products. Experimental farms will be located so that the people need not waste time, money and energy in experimenting, but may take advantage of every new and valuable feature after it is thoroughly tested.

Zion markets will be one of the distinctive features of the colony. Zion will handle the various products as a whole, receiving them from the people on stated days, and shipping them direct to Europe and New York in our own special steamers. In this manner the Zion brand will be built up and established.

The first permanent buildings to be erected in Zion paradise plantation will be Zion tabernacle, where all the people can assemble.

The next buildings in importance will be conveniently located schools for all the children, officered and conducted upon the most approved methods, under the special direction of the first apostle of the Christian Catholic Apostolic church in Zion, which system has already been so successful in the educational institutions of Zion City, Ill.

It is also in contemplation to erect and conduct first class agricultural, domestic science and manual training colleges.

The social life of our people will receive the most careful consideration to the end that purity, peace and progress may reign.

Arrangements have been made with the Mexican government for the free admission of the household

AMERICAN BANKERS IN CONVENTION

(Scripps News Association.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The thirty-first annual convention of the American Bankers' association opened here this morning at the new National theater, with about 4000 members responding to the roll call. The session was opened by President E. F. Swinney, president of the First National bank of Kansas City, Mo. Bishop Henry Y. Satterlee delivered the opening prayer. After the roll call the Hon. Henry B. F. MacFarland, president of the board of commissioners of the District of Columbia, welcomed the bankers on behalf of the city. He was followed by John Joy Edson, president of the Bankers' association, District of Columbia, who welcomed the members in behalf of the bankers of the District of Columbia. Several other welcoming addresses were delivered, to which President Swinney responded. Secretary James R. Branch of New York and Treasurer Ralph Van Vechton of Chicago submitted their annual reports.

Frank A. Vanderlip, vice president of the National City bank, New York, and the Hon. William B. Ridgely, comptroller of the currency, Washington, D. C., delivered short addresses.



It Really Astonished Mr. Cooper to Find His Wife So Lacking in Economy.


