A person in close touch with the Heinze interests says the new company that has been formed to take over the Heinze properties in litigation will form the nucleus of a much larger consolidation, involving practically the entire Butte camp.

Chinese Want Emperor.

Before the Imperial Chinese commission left Seattle a petition signed by the Chinese Reform societies of Portland, Seattle and Vancouver was presented to them, asking for the abdication of the empress dowager and the restoration of the throne to the emperor.

Former Spokane Attorney Dead.

In the Wallace hospital last night Frank Leonard, formerly an attorney of Spokane, died from an acute attack of pneumonia. The dead man read law in the office of Judge Nash in the early days, was admitted and practiced in Spokane and Wallace about 10 years ago.

Irrigation Held Up By Bank.

The refusal of Spokane bondholders of the Prosser Falls Land & Irrigation company to sign an agreement reducing the company's water right is causing the Sunnyside irrigation project to be held up. The Traders bank of Spokane holds \$50,000 bonds of the Prosser company, of which E. F. Benson of Prosser is the principal owner.

Rainmaker At Dawson.

The Canadian Yukon government has closed the contract with Chas. Hatfield, a Los Angeles rainmaker to work in Klondike camp for four months during the coming season, virtually all the open season, beginning May 1. He will get \$10,000 if he succeeds in keeping a sufficient supply of water to operate the hydraulic and other placer mines all summer.
