Fort Missoula will not be abandoned by the government. Word to that effect was received at Missoula yesterday.

Pullman citizens have organized a Law Enforcement league with a capital stock of \$10,000. The stock has no par value and is assessable.

Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday for a creamery at Daisy, Stevens county. The capital stock is \$3500, divided into shares of \$25 each.

The county commissioners of Lincoln county will allow no disorderly houses on the outskirts of the town of Davenport or anywhere in the county.

A large grading outfit in charge of Pete Eshbach broke camp at Granger Wednesday and started 15 miles down the valley to Grandview where grading was started on the North Coast railway.

Outfits and masts for three wireless telegraph stations to be erected in the Puget Sound district are now at Mare Island, preparatory to being shipped to the navy yard at Bremerton for installation.

The federal government will institute proceedings to restrain the Cascade Canal company from over appropriating of the Yakima river. The reclamation service is anxious that the company limit its appropriation to last year's supply.

The board of state land commissioners has purchased bonds amounting to \$33,000 issued by the town of Puyallup against the proposed gravity water supply system of the town. The bonds bear 6 per cent interest.

Through an amendment to the Tacoma constitution, becoming effective today, the city officials will receive the following salary per year in the future: Mayor, \$2000; treasurer, \$2400; controller, \$2000; the salaries of the other officers are fixed by a vote of the council.

Paul Alexanderoff, who has been in Seattle for the past six years as an agent of the Russian government, sent here in the first instance to be educated in English, is authoritatively for the statement that a Russian steamship line, to be operated in connection with the Asiatic-Chinese railway and the Trans-Siberian railway, is to be established between Seattle and Vladivostok.

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
