# IMPATIENT BUSINESS MEN BUILD STORES ON SUNDAY

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—The impatience of business men to provide quarters in which to recommence business led to the continuance of building operations in many places. On Van Ness avenue and Sutter streets many retail stores were pushed to completion. One hundred and fifty men will be put to work this week inspecting 50,000 chimneys, for which a fee of \$1 will be charged. It is expected that the street

kitchens will soon be a thing of the past in the residence district. The bread line is growing shorter each day. The number of rations issued now is about 90,000 a day. Four thousand people are being fed from the soup kitchens.

The food and clothing distribution is well systematized and an ample supply of each is on hand for present needs. In all, 12,000 cars of supplies were received. The total relief fund was \$6,533,247.32.

# WOMAN KILLED IN COLLISION

ERIE, Pa., May 21.—Mrs. Julia G. Young, wife of A. W. Young of Cleveland, was instantly killed on the lake road near here last night when the automobile in which she was riding struck a telegraph pole. Mrs. Young was thrown out and her skull fractured. Three others in the party, W. H. Shurmer, Carl Schurmer and A. W. Young, were more or less injured. The party had left Cleveland to make the run here and go to Buffalo.

# HE EMBALMED BODY OF RICE



# MANY PEOPLE GREET NORRIS & ROWE CIRCUS



Excellent Parade and Splendid Program Attract a Large Matinee Audience—Special Features Tonight.

That the circus is a typically American institution as it is at present conducted was again evidenced when the Norris and Rowe special train rolled into the Northern Pacific yards Sunday morning, and a large concourse of both large and small people assembled to give it cordial greeting.

It took a number of years, some 18 in all, for Norris and Rowe to attain their present position as big showmen, but they have arrived at the zenith of their career and are giving the public ever so much more entertainment for the money than could be reasonably expected. The parade this morning was an excellent spectacle and satisfied the crowds that crowded both sides of the streets.

bears, snakes and pythons, sea lions, impressive big lions and tigers, kangaroos, monkeys, a large puma, deer, elk, etc. In the menagerie tent is also exhibited the thoroughbred racing stock recently purchased from Marcus Daly's "Bitter Root" ranch, a score of sleek coated Shetland ponies and ever so many other interesting things.

It takes a good half hour to see all the wonders, and it's a half hour profitably spent.

In the big show proper there was given an excellent program made up of somersault bareback riders, high school horses, jockey and hurdle riders, aerial cyclists, Japanese midair acrobats, leapers, vaulters, tumblers, gymnasts, hippodrome races and all the hundred and one acts shown in the modern prosperous circus.

Tonight's exhibition promises to attract an unusually large attendance. The circus is located at the old college grounds. There will be two performances tomorrow, afternoon and evening.

# LABORS' REALM

WILL BE ADJUSTED.
