

RUSSIANS OFFER BOUNTY FOR SLAUGHTERED JEWS

PEASANTS PREPARE TO REAP A HARVEST OF HUMAN LIVES IN THE NAME OF THE CZAR

BERLIN, June 19.—Prominent Jews here are receiving details of massacres and plundering of Jews in various parts of Russia.

At Caroki the authorities posted a telegram alleged to have been received from the czar ordering all Jews killed. Thereupon the peasants attacked and slaughtered many.

Wealthy gentiles at Nishin offered \$5 for each Jew killed, \$2 for each one wounded and \$1 for each male infant killed.

Peasants everywhere are arming to enrich themselves by earning these bounties on dead Jews.

ATTEMPT TO KILL TREPPOFF

ST. PETERSBURG, June 19.—It is reported that an attempt to assassinate Trepoff was made by a woman masquerading as Prince Harishkin.

The woman gained admittance to the palace, drew and drew a revolver. When Trepoff approached the weapon was seized and the woman arrested.

SOLDIERS ARE IN REBELLION

WARSAW, June 19.—It is reported that a regiment of artillery and a regiment of infantry at Novogorod fortress have mutinied. The Seawadki estate in Siedletz was attacked by terrorists who sacked the castle and escaped with 75,000 roubles.

TO CLOSE FOR PICNIC

In accordance with the proclamation of Mayor Dagggett the city offices will close tomorrow in honor of the picnic of the Spokane Grocers association. The picnic of the grocers will be held at Medical Lake and if the weather is fair thousands will attend. Every grocery store and meat market in the city will be closed tomorrow. The Washington Water Power company has made arrangements for special trains to handle the large crowd.

Cars will be run every half hour. The first car will leave Spokane at 6 a. m. and the last at 9 p. m. The last car will leave Medical Lake at 10:30.

GREAT INCREASE NOTED IN SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

The school census for the Second ward, which has just been finished, shows that there are 1,326 children of school age in the ward. This is an increase of 96 over the figures of last year. The enumerators are still at work in the other wards.

The Second ward has the smallest number of school children of any of the wards. If the others show the same percentage of increase the census this year will run between 14,000 and 15,000 and will be an increase of 2,000 over last year.

FIRST WARD WANTS ANOTHER SCHOOL

Another school will be asked for by the First Ward Improvement club. At the meeting of the club last night C. E. Greenless reported that he had found 513 children in the district bounded on the north and west by the Spokane river, by the O. R. & N. and Northern Pacific tracks on the south and the city limits on the east. The club criticised the condition of the pavements on Third and Fourth avenue, east of Division street.

NEGROES CELEBRATE EMANCIPATION DAY


HOUSTON, Tex., June 19.—The negroes of this city and surrounding districts are celebrating Emancipation day in a more elaborate manner than usual. The celebration will last two days and has attracted several thousand negroes from the vicinity to this city. The principal feature of today is the grand industrial street parade which will include many floats, illustrating the accomplishment of the negroes as merchants, builders, manufacturers and tradesmen.

CARS ON NEW LINE

ST. PETERSBURG, June 19.—The most shocking reports are arriving in this city almost daily of the peasants' revolt in the northern provinces and of the savage efforts of the Cossacks to suppress it. In Morshansk the soldiers burned 200 houses, first firing on the occupants, so as to keep them inside. One hundred women were cremated. At Kazan peasants seized a freight train on a side track and sent it whirling upon the main tracks just as a fast express appeared near the station. Forty passengers were killed and nearly 100 injured. Scores of executions occur daily. The horrifying spectacle of a line of gibbets, with bodies dangling under guard of a sentry, is not unusual.

GRAND MASTER OPENS COUNCIL

The eleventh annual assembly of the state grand council, Royal and Select Masters, was opened this afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Masonic temple by Richard J. Graham of Seattle, most illustrious grand master. The grand council will remain in session this afternoon and evening. The super excellent degree, which was to have been conferred tonight was conferred last night by courtesy of the grand chapter of the Royal Arch Masons.

The nineteenth annual convocation of the grand commandery, Knights Templars, will be held tomorrow and Thursday. Tomorrow at 9 o'clock there will be a parade of the grand commandery.

The commandery will be opened at 10 o'clock by Cornelius Driscoll, right eminent grand commander, of Renton, Wash.

PATTISON IS DEAD

(Scripps News Association.) EATON, Ohio, June 19.—Governor A. L. Harris says he will not assume the duties of office until after the late Governor Pattison's funeral. He will continue Governor Pattison's appointees for a time at least.

The funeral of Governor Pattison is undetermined. It will probably be held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock with services at the Methodist church.

John M. Pattison, governor of Ohio, died of Bright's disease at 4:20 yesterday afternoon at his home in Milford. One week ago the governor was carried into his home, from which he had gone five months before to his inauguration as chief executive of the state, the intervening time having been spent on a bed of pain.

His death came suddenly and was unexpected even by his physicians and family.

Governor Pattison had not completed the reorganization of the various state departments and institutions at the time of his death, and inasmuch as Acting Governor Harris is a republican it is regarded as improbable that any of the remaining republican appointees will be disturbed.

ST. LOUIS TO BUILD BRIDGE

WASHINGTON, June 19.—The house committee on interstate and foreign commerce has authorized a favorable report on the bill authorizing St. Louis to build a free bridge across the Mississippi. The house also passed the militia bill appropriating \$2,000,000, mostly for rifle practice.

The committee authorized a favorable report on an appropriation of \$25,000 to pay the president's traveling expenses.

COP COMPELLED TO CRACK HIS HEAD

A desperate fight, which occurred in the Main block last night between Patrolman Pearson and Tom Bowen and Edward Vick, resulted in the arrest of the two belligerents, a battered mouth of the policeman and a torn scalp of Vick.

The men were making a disturbance and the policeman escorted them downstairs. They returned and showed fight, when Pearson clubbed Vick into submission.

NATIONAL LEAGUE SUMMER SESSION

NEW YORK, June 19.—The summer meeting of the National league of baseball clubs convened at the Hotel Victoria this forenoon and will probably remain in session during part of the afternoon. This is the first time that the league holds a summer meeting. A considerable amount of business, which has come up during the early part of the season is before the league and will be considered and disposed of before the meeting adjourns. There will not be another meeting until the season is closed.

BEEF BILL IS PASSED

WASHINGTON, June 19.—The beef bill, otherwise known as the meat inspection law, passed the house today.

Senator Beveridge and President Roosevelt conferred on the beef bill this morning. Beveridge said: "The house put back all the teeth in my mill. One tooth is filled, but it is still serviceable to do good work."

MRS. MYERS MUST HANG

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., June 19.—The state supreme court overruled a motion for rehearing in the Maggie Meyers case. She is sentenced to hang June 29 for the murder of her husband. Governor Folk will reprieve her for 30 days.

OHIO STRIKE IS SETTLED

COLUMBUS, O., June 19.—Ohio miners have settled their differences and were ordered today to resume work. This includes the return of union men to the mines of eastern Ohio.

TWENTY YEARS IN PRISON FOR KIDNAPPING SMALL BOY

STOLE CHILD IN HOPE OF SECURING RANSOM TO PAY A DEBT AND EARNS CONVICT STRIPES INSTEAD.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 19.—John J. Keane, the former broker who kidnapped Freddie Muth, aged 7, in this city, was sentenced to 20 years for the crime today. At the trial the boy told of his captivity.

Keane pleaded that the boy had every chance to escape if he wanted.

At 10 o'clock this morning Keane faced a magistrate on preliminary hearing. An hour later the grand jury had considered testimony resulting in the indictment.

The prisoner was taken before Judge Sulzberger, testimony heard and the case submitted. The prisoner was sentenced within an incredibly short time from the date of apprehension.

Two hours and a half from the time he was arraigned for preliminary hearing Keane was ready for commitment to the penitentiary.

The boy's father is a wealthy jeweler of Philadelphia. Keane admitted kidnapping the child, saying he did it in hopes of securing a \$2000 ransom with which to pay a debt. The boy was found with Keane yesterday.

SUIT INVOLVES PROPERTY RIGHTS IN HEART OF CITY

A suit which, if successful, will unsettle property rights on Riverside avenue in the very heart of the business district of Spokane was commenced today by Minnie C. Forster and Ada F. Macho, heirs of the late George Forster, against Hannah Raznik, George Ambs and Lennox & Hansen. The plaintiffs ask to have a 14½ foot alley opened up from Sprague to Riverside about 150 feet west of Bernard street.

Much ancient history of Spokane is rehearsed in the complaint. In 1881, when the Resurvey addition to Spokane and Havermales addition were platted a space 14½ feet wide was left between them. This space ran from Sprague avenue to the river.

A few years later when the townsite was replatted the boundaries of the two additions were run together and the 14½ foot strip wiped out. The plaintiffs allege that when the additions were platted it was the intention of the dedicators to leave this 14½ foot strip for an alley.

That portion of the strip which fronts on the south side of Riverside has been taken possession of by Hannah Raznik and is occupied by the Limit saloon. The plaintiffs own the property to the west, which is now being excavated.

The plaintiffs ask to have the 14½ foot strip opened for an alley. In the block between Riverside and Main avenues the strip runs through a brick building occupied by J. D. Buchanan.

Years ago the Security Savings society seized that portion of the strip fronting on the south side of

Main avenue for taxes. They attempted to sell it at a sheriff's sale but were restrained by the superior court. Later they were compelled to open it up for an alley.

BOYS ROBBED FLOWER BEDS

Max Berry, age 15, of 312 Market street; George Skine, age 14, of 37 Main avenue, and Frank Hogdon, age 14, of 442 Boone avenue, were arrested about 11 o'clock last night by Patrolman Willis and booked at the police station on a charge of stealing flowers. They have been sent to the juvenile court.

The boys last night confessed to Sergeant McPhee that they had stolen the flowers from the lawns of residents on Boone avenue.

The Hogdon boy was allowed to go home last night, his aged and widowed mother being ill at the hospital.

SAN FRANCISCO TO GET \$12,000,000

(Scripps News Association.) WASHINGTON, June 19.—The president has agreed to the proposition made by the San Francisco delegation to which the secretary of the treasury has given his approval, that the government deposit \$12,000,000 in San Francisco

banks on the security of San Francisco city bonds.

The terms of years for which the deposits may remain has not yet been determined, but Secretary Shaw has given the assurance that they will not be called in until the treasury needs them.

Mrs. Guerin charges her husband with cruelty. She alleged that he taunted her with flirting with other men and slapped her face. The defendant in defense asserted that his wife had a vixenish temper. He admitted boxing her ears, but said he only did it when she used a slipper on his head.
