

At the Theatres

THE SPOKANE.

This is the story of the play, "The Strength of the Weak," in which Florence Roberts appears here for three nights beginning today evening. The leading character is a young girl who has written a book under an assumed name, and which has become the sensation of the hour. The book in reality is the life of the girl, who has been betrayed by her guardian, and who, realizing her shame, resorts to the book to express her belief that a good woman falling can by dint of her own efforts regain her self-respect and position. The success of the book leads the girl to hope that she can with the money repay the guardian and thereby cancel her obligation to him for her education. When she graduates she leaves for New York and casts loose from the man who was responsible for her downfall. She subsequently meets and falls in love with a noble young fellow and consents to be his wife, but not until after she has acquainted him with the story of her past and been forgiven. The former guardian appears on the scene and attempts to renew his relations with the unfortunate girl, and she by accident learns that the man she loves and her betrayer are father and son.

On Wednesday evening Florence Roberts closes her engagement here in "Magda," also a problem play.

"Sis Hopkins," with Miss Rose Melville in the title role, will be the attraction at the Spokane Friday and Saturday, Dec. 7 and 8. Miss Melville's engagement here is limited to three performances, including a matinee on Saturday. Her long portrayal of this role is a matter of theatrical history. This season she is surrounded by the same company that has marked her performance in previous years, and the production is maintained at the same standard.

For whatever of merit there was in the presentation of "Richard the Third" at the Spokane last evening the credit must be given to John Griffith, because his supporting company was so weak as to be positively bad at times.

Griffith's delineation of the malevolent, sinister and cunning character of "Richard" was good as a whole, though at times in the climaxes he screeched and raved in a manner bordering closely upon ranting. A fair sized audience witnessed the performance and its patience was taxed to the limit by the way the play was drawn out. For some unexplained reason the curtain was not rung up till fully 9 o'clock, and it was nearly midnight before the audience was released.

THE AUDITORIUM.

Beginning Sunday evening for the week following the Shirley company will present Theodore Kremer's drama entitled "The Triumph of an Empress." The chief character is Catherine II. The scenic settings are described as magnificent. The first act shows the court yard at the convent of Novgorod, the second the library in the tower of the convent, the third the terrace at the palace of Peterhof, the fourth the throne room in the palace of the Kremlin at Moscow and the fifth the royal bed chamber of the palace. The costumes are historically correct. Miss Shirley as Catherine, the light hearted, care free young girl, as the lover, as the wife, as an empress and mother will have an opportunity to show new phases of her art and capabilities.

THE WASHINGTON.

There is no vaudeville headliner for the week, all of the numbers being strong. One of the feature acts is that of the Lefell trio of gymnasts, who have a triple horizontal bar act that is said to be a revelation. The three Poirers have an act of gymnastic maneuvers. The Kauffman sisters have a Dutch comedy act called "His First Smoke." Jay Bogert is a blackface comedian. He also plays a number of musical instruments. Imaz and Lorella have a novelty acrobatic act that will show some surprises. The Kimball brothers have one of the chief comedy acts for the week. Charles Allman will have for his illustrated song, "Star of My Life," and the moving pictures will show "Race for a Wife."

THE COLUMBIA.

"The Belle of Japan," comedy drama with oriental setting but up-to-date, will be the bill for one week, beginning with a matinee tomorrow afternoon. There is no lack of comedy in the piece, the chief funmakers being an American sea captain, the daughter of a Yankee and a maiden aunt. The scenes of the play are laid in and around Yokohama, and a number of quaint Japanese characters are brought into the piece. The principal Japanese character is that of Titi, an artist's model and Geisha girl, the role being in the hands of Miss Bessie Clifton, who is said to be a clever comedienne. Henglar, an English divekeeper of Hongkong, and Diana Gaines, his accomplice, are the chief characters entering into the plot, while the American artist is the chief instrument in foiling their schemes.
