# TEDDY AND TAFT AFTER FAIRBANK'S SCALP NOW

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 15.—The surrender of Foraker in Ohio is regarded in Washington as the beginning of the end.

The nomination of Taft is now anticipated as the inevitable conclusion. In fact, little surprise would be felt here if a band wagon rush were to take place.

Foraker and Ohio have been the center of the battle line of the anti-Roosevelt forces. Indiana and Pennsylvania have been the right and left wing. The center has caved, and it remains to be seen whether the conservatives can rally and close up the breach.

Foraker and Ohio have been regarded as the only strong point in the opposition's line. Fairbanks is weak, and so is Penrose and his Pennsylvania gang. Foraker had the courage to come into the open and make a clear cut issue with the Roosevelt-Taft combination. Neither Fairbanks nor Penrose have dared to do so.

Back of Foraker have been the tier of eastern states, under such leaders as Aldrich, Scott, Crane, Penrose, Elkins and Dewey. Back of them are the money and influence of Harriman, Morgan, Hill and Rockefeller. They planned to break the administration's policies by breaking Taft in his own state, and preventing the nomination of a Roosevelt republican for presidential candidate in 1908.

This whole opposition appears to be crumbling. With the caving of Ohio, Indiana is left without any state to take the brunt of the attack. Fairbanks and his managers were craftily planning to let Foraker take the drubbing, and then to come into the convention under cover of the Ohio fight and secure the nomination for Fairbanks.

Now Fairbanks will have to play his game without a stalking horse. He will either have to withdraw from the race or come out and fight Taft in the open.

The friends of Secretary Taft know that Fairbanks has been working secretly against him and against President Roosevelt. Steps have been taken in Washington to find out just what newspapers Fairbanks secretly controls, and the editorial and news policies of these papers have been watched carefully. The results are conclusive in showing the hostility of Fairbanks to both Roosevelt and Taft.

Indiana will be the next state to receive attention. The burrowing under the ground policy will have to end. Roosevelt's familiar slogan uttered 7 years ago, "the who

is not for me is against me," will be revived. It will be applied to Indiana, and the politicians of that state will be given a chance to say whether they are for Fairbanks or Taft.

Then he began to feel drowsy, as though he were doped, and when one of the men asked him to go in and sit down he fell an easy victim. He awoke minus \$85, a \$11 nugget pin and his gold watch.
