

OLD STYLE WAR AND NEW

To raise funds to furnish and maintain the two veterans' halls in the new state armory building, the Sedgewick and Reno posts of the Grand Army, United War Veterans, Women's Relief Corp and Ladies' Auxiliary of the U. S. W. V., have united to give a grand military ball at the armory the evening of March 25.

Preceding the grand march an interesting and instructive program of one hour has been arranged, which will consist of a concert number by full military band, followed by a battalion drill by companies H and I of the N. G. W., a fancy drill by the drill of the Scottish Highlanders and a short parade and comparative drill by a

platoon from the G. A. R. armed with Springfield muzzle loading muskets, one from the Spanish war veterans armed with breech loading Springfield muskets, which the volunteers used during the war with Spain and the Philippine insurrection, and a platoon from the national guard armed with the modern magazine high power Springfield rifle used by the American army at the present time. This number is intended to show the evolution of the musket from 1861 when there were ten counts or distinct movements required to load the muzzle loader, to the present time, when one movement does the same work.

For those who do not care to dance there will be card tables in the lodge halls in charge of ladies of the reception committee who will organize the tables and see that everyone is entertained.

X-Ray Takes Great Physician's Arm

BIRMINGHAM, England, March 13.—Dr. Hall Edwards, one of England's foremost surgeons, and radiographer to the Birmingham general hospital, the Queen's, the Orthopedic and the Spinal hospitals, has just lost his left arm, the price of persistent work with the x-ray.

He was among the first to discover its great value to surgical operators, and, in fact, the first operation from an x-ray photograph was from one taken by him on Feb. 14, 1896. He was very successful with the ray during the Boer war.

Thereafter he first noted on his hands some excrescences which had the appearance of warts, and which spread. Following this came pains in his left hand, gradually extending up the arm. These were so severe ultimately that he could sleep only under the influence of opiates. It was a fully developed case of x-ray dermatitis, a sort of bone cancer. Finally amputation became absolutely necessary.
