NEW YORK, June 2.—For the first time in many years a captain and his entire crew are under surveillance, pending an investigation of the charge of scuttling a ship.

When the Ward line steamer Vigilance reached this port May 24, she had on board the survivors of the steamer Cyclades, which was wrecked on a reef in the Bahamas May 13. The vessel was met at quarantine by a tug full of detectives from an agency which makes a specialty of investigating marine disasters. Capt.
