**TAFT'S MEMORIAL DAY BREAK TO BE MADE THE MOST OF BY FAVORITE SONS LIKE CANNON AND FAIRBANKS.**

CHICAGO, June 4.—Roosevelt may be the next nominee of the republican party, after all. Sudden life has been injected into the presidential boom of favorite sons by belief that Taft can be defeated on the issue of his remarkable Memorial Day address at Grant's tomb, in which he referred to Grant's drunkenness. "Second elective terms" are busy again trying to force Roosevelt to accept the nomination if he sees that Taft is sure of defeat.
