WANTS CITY TO BE HIS PARTNER

JUDGE ARMSTRONG DOWN IN TEXAS, PROPOSES UNIQUE COMPROMISE IN MATTER OF MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP.

FT. WORTH, Tex., June 25.—Geo. W. Armstrong, former county judge, banker and successful business man, fathers a unique idea—that of joint municipal utilities here.

He backs up the theory with an offer to the city to combine with his commercial plant the municipal plant now furnishing street lights.

When the city commissioners had recovered their breath after his proposal, he outlined his plan. Judge Armstrong suggests a board of five directors, two to be named by the city, two by the stockholders of his company, the fifth by these four. Political favoritism, he argues, will be checked by the two members representing the stockholders, while unduly high prices and poor service will be thwarted by the city government members.

City officials object that the plan of merger by which the city and company plants are brought to equal value and bonds issued for extensions is a violation of the state constitution forbidding any municipality to invest or lend its credit to private enterprise.

Judge Armstrong declares the constitutional provision is not violated in his offer. If it is so held he offers a substitute in a set of mutual counter leases.

So confident is Judge Armstrong of his proposition that he offers to bear the expense of a city referendum election if the matter is put to a vote of the citizens and lost. If he wins, he proposes the city bear half the election expense. Rates are what interest the taxpayer and bill payer. Armstrong's proposed arrangement guarantees a cost not to exceed a fixed amount. The city and stockholders are protected from loss in operation in a clause requiring the rate to be a certain per cent above cost of operation.

Should the city be a partner of a private company? This promises to be the vital issue in Fort Worth's next municipal campaign.
