

## FRANCHISE FOR FOUR CAR LINES

An amended ordinance was filed today with the city clerk by Graves, Kizer & Graves, asking for a blanket franchise permitting the Spokane & Inland Empire Railway Co. to extend four of its city lines into the east and southeast sections of the city. The franchise is asked under the usual restrictions governing such matters, to-wit: Five cent fares, with general transfer to all lines of the company; a franchise tax of two mills per car mile; the requirement that the company improve and maintain the street between its tracks and for two feet on either side, and the usual limitation of the life of the franchise to 25 years.

It is sought to extend the new fairground line to Opportunity, in the Spokane valley east of the city. This line will run east of Sprague avenue from its present end at Freya street to the east city limits, thence south to First avenue, thence east on First for about one half mile to a private right of way, then east to its terminus at Opportunity. The line will be between three and four miles long from Wall and Riverside to the city limits and will be one of the longest rides for a nickel on the Traction company's system. Its total length will be about eight miles.

The Union Park line is sought to be extended east on Fifth, from its present terminus at Regal street, to Freya street, and south on Freya to Eleventh avenue, where it will end.

The short Cook's hill line, which leaves the Altamont line at Hatch street, will be extended south on Hatch street to its junction with the Southeast boulevard, thence

southeast on the boulevard to Sixteenth avenue, thence east on Sixteenth and Seventeenth avenue to Ray street, on the east line of the Ravenwood addition.

The fourth extension planned will leave the Manito park line at Ninth and Grand and pass behind the city reservoir on Hill and City View streets to Rosedale boulevard, thence southeast on the boulevard to Hatch street, where it will stop.

An application for a franchise for that portion of the Opportunity line lying outside the city limits has been filed with the county commissioners.

People residing in the southeast part of the city are very much in favor of the proposed extensions and have a petition out asking the city council that the franchise be granted. At a meeting of the East Spokane Improvement club last night the matter was brought up by a committee from the Altamont Heights Improvement club and was unanimously endorsed.

## DIED IN FEAR OF OPERATION

SISTER OF NURSE WHO LEAP-ED INTO RIVER ADVANCES NEW THEORY OF MOTIVE FOR HER ACTION.

Did Miss Helen Wood, who was a nurse at Sacred Heart hospital, adopt suicide in fear of an operation for appendicitis? This seems the most plausible theory in accounting for her self destruction. The sufferings of patients who were operated on for appendicitis and on whom she waited may have preyed on her mind until she feared the operation herself and preferred death by drowning rather than to go through the sufferings she had witnessed in her patients?

Information that she was subject to appendicitis was given out today by her sister, Mrs. Carolyn Eubanks of Walla Walla, who is now here.

"I believe that this sickness and resultant despondency was the cause of my sister's suicide," declared Mrs. Eubanks.

Mrs. J. H. Fields, the mother, is too overcome to talk and is confined to her room.

Miss Wood had always told she was an orphan, which was considered odd as it develops she had a mother living.

With regard to this Mrs. Eubanks stated this morning that her sister had told her frequently that she pretended to be an orphan so that when she got sick, which was frequently, she would not always be sent to her home.

Search for the body has been given up after three days of dragging and dynamiting the river without success. Bodies rise to the surface after being in the water a certain length of time, and a lookout in the vicinity of where the body is supposed to be will be kept.

With regard to the letter the unfortunate girl received and which caused her much weeping just previous to her suicide, her sister disclaims any knowledge of what its contents might be. A search was made among the effects for it but without success, so it is presumed the missive lies at the bottom of the river with the body. Neither the sister nor mother wrote the letter.

## STOLEN THUNDER

The Saturday Evening Post gives the republicans this to think over: "In stealing campaign thunder neither party has a monopoly. Mr. Bryan's proposal to insure bank deposits is of republican origin. The bill introduced by the chairman of the house committee on banking and currency in January last (reported by the committee February 29) provided that the banks should deposit with the treasury five per cent of their note issues and deposits, creating a fund 'to guarantee the payment of all individual deposits, banknotes, bank deposits and government deposits without discrimination or preference.' The bill was recommended by such eminent financial authorities as Horace White and Lyman J. Gage, secretary of the treasury under McKinley.

he wrote, 'that government supervision of them, and many people ignorantly supposed a national bank must be safe because the government stood behind it. 'I assert,' he wrote, 'that government supervision, state or national, should be withdrawn and the public be left to the terrific school of experience; or that the government should completely perform its work and impose such obligations upon the banks as will truly justify the confidence the people have in these quasi-public institutions.'

"All this, of course, is recent history—to which we refer merely because a good many enthusiastic republican organs are citing deposit insurance as an example of the democratic mind's peculiar liability to insanity."
