The Northwestern league season is all over. Even the shouting is over. That ended quite awhile ago in Spokane. From start to finish the contest was not close all the time, by reason of Vancouver's spurt which none of the other teams could begin to crimp. While Vancouver started out in poor shape, it did not take Captain Nordyke long to whip his men into a pennant winning stride which never slackened. The Spokane Indians held the lead for a time and looked like sure winners, but the managers, money made over the large attendance here, made the mistake of absorbing the continuous baseball notion with the inevitable result—the players got stale. Aberdeen was strengthened early in the season and when the Cats got into motion were contenders for the pennant. Tacoma played consistently all through the season. The hard luck team of all was the one in Butte. Lack of support drove Russ Hall and his men out of the smoke laden burg and for a team that was on the road so long its showing was remarkable. Although the Outcasts finish next to the cellar they are considered as good as any team in the league, not excepting Vancouver, and with the same opportunities would have contended for the pennant.

Dugdale in Seattle made a most miserable showing. This may be attributed to two things. Mishaps early in the season and dissension in the ranks later. Terry McKune, the fast shortstop, started in like a flash when he came out from St. Paul, but always trouble with his ankles, these finally gave out on him. This was a blow from which the team never recovered. As Dugdale would not spend money to fill short he got along by shifting his players. # GOLD SHOWERS ON PRIZE RING SCRAPS

The fighting game is the most lucrative vocation in the world. Joe Gans went to Ft. Erie, stepped into the ring with Frank Erne, shot out his right, and down went the lightweight champion. That one punch netted Gans at least \$100,000 worth of engagements.

Only a few months ago Stanley Ketchel stepped into a ring in California with Mike "Twin" Sullivan. The latter feinted, Ketchel dodged, shot over his right and down went Sullivan. Ketchel got \$6500 for that one punch.

A few years ago England sent its champion, Pedlar Palmer, to America to vanquish Terry McGovern. "Terrible Terry" stepped into the ring, shot out his right, down went the Englishman and while the referee was counting, Mr. Cashier handed Terry's manager something in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

There are many fighters in America, some still in the ring and others retired, who have fat and juicy bank rolls. There is Tom Sharkey, who left a man of war to enter the ring and accumulated gold so fast it made him dizzy, and Tommy Ryan, who gathered in the shekels for many years, until age laid him on the shelf with all his gold around him. It is a fallacy that fighters dissipate their wealth away. John L. Sullivan did it for years—and being the best known fistic artist, the world decided others in kind. George Dixon threw all his wealth away, and Joe Gans, recently defeated by Nelson, has done likewise.

But the great majority of real champions have stowed themselves away with enough to live on in comfort and luxury for all life. Jim Jeffries, the champion of champions, carried his fortune to Los Angeles, and has been adding to it ever since.

Bob Fitzsimmons and Jim Hall fought for a \$40,000 purse at New Orleans. Bob won and the manager of the club handed him a check for \$41,000, a thousand being for training expenses. But when Bob tried to get it cashed it was turned back. Fitzsimmons didn't get a cent for that battle and neither did Hall. The men had agreed to fight winner take all.

The next biggest purse was the \$30,000 given for the first Gans-Nelson battle at Goldfield. Nelson got the biggest end of that, although Gans was the champion at the time and won the battle. That fight holds the record in the matter of receipts. The gate was \$69,715.

The fighters, however, have frequently cut more than the Goldfield sum amounted to. The Jeffries-Sharkey contest in New York drew \$66,300, and the fighters received \$36,465. 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

# GREAT SPORT TO BE ENGLAND'S NEXT MINISTER TO THIS LAND

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Lord Desborough will in all probability succeed Ambassador Bryce as the British representative at Washington. When Bryce was appointed it was with the understanding, at his request, that it be for only a short term of service, and it is understood now that he will return to England in the spring.

Lord Desborough was seriously considered for the post at the time of Bryce's appointment. He was born in 1855. His public service includes 10 years in parliament, chairmanship of the Thames conservancy board, mayor of Maidenhead, member of a tariff commission and private secretary to Sir W. Harcourt at the exchequer.

Lord Desborough has distinguished himself in many departments of sport. In aquatic he is most celebrated for swimming twice across the Niagara river and for stroking a crew of eight across the English channel. He has climbed the Alps. He has hunted big game in the Rocky mountains, Africa and India. He played on the Oxford harrow eleven, represented the college in a three mile race against Cambridge and rowed

against Cambridge. He won the punting championship three years. Incidentally he has been an author and served as a special correspondent in the second Suakin campaign. He likes the American.
