

ANNANIAS PAIR SAYS JUDGE

Judge Poindexter, republican candidate for congress, takes politics seriously and in consequence applies Roosevelt's "shorter and uglier word" to both Seth Maxwell and J. W. McReynolds. Maxwell is editor of the Walla Walla Statesman and supplied alleged statistics of Judge Poindexter's record as a Walla Walla attorney, in which the judge was represented as a fire-eating southerner, and candidate for superior judge on that sort of platform. Mr. McReynolds wrote a communication in which he recalled fiery remarks he said the judge made, proving the latter to still be an unreconstructed "confed," etc.

Judge Poindexter tells The Press that he was not a candidate for superior judge when Maxwell says he was, and that the rest of Maxwell's reminiscences are about on a par with this. The judge also says he never made the speech McReynolds says he made. He quit the democrats in 1896 on account

of not agreeing with Bryan, and has been a republican ever since. The object of the attack on Judge Poindexter appears to be to show that he was a democrat of inflammatory sincerity until he saw that the only chance of getting office in this state was by being a republican, wherefore he flopped. All of which, figureatively speaking, inclines the judge to search out his bowie and go among these opponents. He lists them as full fledged members of the Annanias club.

The lecture is generally unfinished, but police protection enables Sid to escape unscathed, or practically so. He is a strapping six footer, a North Carolinian by birth and a Georgian by adoption.

Chicago Grain Market.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—The majority of wheat traders are looking for a dull narrow market between now and election. Outside interest has been small for some time, but Saturday trading was the dullist in some weeks. The gradual dwindling of export trade, with the continued piling up of stocks, also has been discouraging to the average traders, and there has been considerable quiet liquidation recently. Improvement in the export demand or more injury to the Argentine crop than has so far occurred, prices are not expected to show much advance. The few corn bulls are banking on continued light receipts and wet weather to stimulate the market. New corn is beginning to move quietly, several of the low grade being included in Saturday receipts. All other markets report quiet a liberal sale. 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


