Reports were received over the long distance phone this morning that the showing in the upraise in the Idora had improved and that there was nearly three feet of clean shipping ore exposed.

## EASTERN MARKETS

**NEW YORK, March 15.**—Reductions in steel prices are bringing out a better supply of small orders. The copper situation shows little improvement. B. R. T. earnings are improving over last year at the rate of over \$2000 a day. Big independents say U. S. Steel has booked most of the large structural orders since the cut in prices. The National City bank and First National show a most important reduction in loans in the bank statement and the Park bank the largest increase in cash. Twenty active roads declined 1.19 per cent. Twelve industrials are unchanged. The regular quarterly dividend of \$2 on American Telegraph and Telephone was declared.

### Chicago Grain Market.

**CHICAGO, March 15.**—Bull leaders and others said there was nothing new in the situation other than what has already developed in the past few days except that they are more convinced that it has come to stay until the leading producing and consuming countries become overburdened with supplies, but that does not seem probable for a long time to come. Traders who are very bearish and are among the leaders on that side, say they had bought down because it was cheaper than to sell the wheat short and stand on it over Sunday. They called attention to a Liverpool cable which said that the advance in prices would probably bring out increased supplies from Russia and added that otherwise the situation was unchanged. One of the sharpest men in the trade calls attention to the bearish sentiment that exists in September wheat and said: "Traders are selling it at nearly 7 cents under July and over 15c under the same month in Liverpool. They are taking big chances, as it is practically on an

export basis with Liverpool." Visible supply: Wheat, increase, 54,000; corn, increase, 56,000; oats, increase, 18,000.

## CONGRESSMEN BEWARE MACE THAT PECKS THEM

**WASHINGTON, March 15.**—Some years ago Col. "Ike" Hill, then sergeant-at-arms of the house of representatives, was ordered to get out the mace to restore order among several wildly quarrelling congressmen.

Col. Hill hurried down with the mace, its silver eagle shining before him. He didn't have any idea what he was expected to do with it when he reached the scene of the disorder. But that didn't worry him any. "Shut up," he shouted, waving the eagle. "Shute up, or I'll let him peck you." The combatants laughed and subsided.

Well, most people wouldn't have any more idea what a mace is for than Col. Hill. There may be a few people here and there who don't even know what it looks like. For the benefit of these The Press hereby gives a picture of the critter, clasped warmly in the arms of Speaker Cannon.

The mace will probably play an important part in the coming extra session of congress when Uncle Joe and his naughty boys get to quarrelling about the rules. It's a good idea for all young congressmen to know the bird by sight. Because if the eagle comes fluttering down the aisle toward them, and they don't sit down and sit tight, close the mouth and fold hands tight in front, they'll be "in contempt." And that means reproof, censure—maybe expulsion.

For the little-known of mace is the final authority in preserving the dignity and decorum in congress.

The mace, then, consists of a silver eagle, with outstretched wings, which sits on a silver ball, which in turn rests on a pillar composed of 13 ebony sticks, bound together with silver bands. When congress convenes it is brought solemnly out, installed on a granite pedestal—and is promptly forgotten.

Its origin goes back to the old Roman days, when the magistrates who corresponded to present day police judges, had maces—they called them fasces then—which were carried about the city by licitors.

A bundle of stout sticks bound together, with a sharp ax fastened to the outside. The judge would warn

the magistrates' orders. If it was a trivial offense, they would use merely the rods. If serious, they would make the culprit lay his head across the gutter and chop it off with the ax.

These fasces soon became an established symbol, not only in Roman government, but with other nations.

The mace doesn't get much exercise in late years. Its invocation recently to quiet John Wesley Gaines of Tennessee was the first trip out in 10 years.
