

# FELL 90 FEET BUT DID NOT MISS WEDDING

PUNKSUTAWNEY, Pa., April 20.—Swathed like a mummy and lying on a cot in the City hospital, James Sharkey, who a week ago fell 90 feet from a bridge, peeped with one eye from his bandages and watched the ceremony that made him a husband.

Miss Bessie McLaughlin, daughter of Justice of the Peace I. B. McLaughlin of Somerville, was the bride.

The marriage register was signed by the injured man, but he had to hold the pen between his teeth to do it, making his mark.

Sharkey fell from a railroad bridge and both arms and one leg were broken, his abdomen was ripped open and his face was bruised almost beyond recognition and one eyelid split. He did not lose consciousness, and demanded that his wedding plans be carried out, as postponed weddings were unlucky.

# WIFE-BEATER FROM IDAHO CAUGHT HERE

With \$846 of the \$1,000 or more which he hastily departed from Newport, Idaho, still in his possession, A. L. Gregory, a saloon keeper, age 27, who severely beat and tried to kill his wife at Newport last Friday, was captured here last night by Detective Lister. Today he will be taken back to Idaho to face a felony charge by Chief Deputy Sheriff Wilcox of Sandpoint.

Gregory, while in a drunken frenzy, drew a revolver and chased his wife through the house, declaring his intention of killing her. The frightened woman managed to wrest the revolver away from him in a final struggle for her life, but was beaten almost insensible, and left weeping and moaning on the floor.

Gregory took all the money he and his wife had and crossed the state line. When arrested here he asserted his willingness to return to Idaho without requisition papers.

**COLLINS COMES BACK.**  
Editor The Press—In your Saturday evening's paper the president of the Equal Rights club takes me to task relative to an article, which I wrote, that appeared in one of the daily papers, in which I said that it was a foregone conclusion that with the reform vote divided between Hutchinson, Hinkle and Fasset and with the rough and tumble vote concentrated on Omo that the latter was sure of election. He asks the question: Did anybody see the saloon voter under the new primary law? In answer let me give him some figures showing the result in the recent primaries. In Barth precinct Mr. Omo got 86 votes against the combined votes for the other candidates of 45. Brickel precinct, another of the Howard street district precincts, gave Mr. Omo 81 against the combined vote for the other three candidates of 30. Brown precinct, another of the down town precincts, gave Mr. Omo 83 against the combined vote for the other three republican candidates of 18.

The gentleman also says that "the republicans nominated J. T. Omo for mayor, and I hope they will not turn around and elect a democrat just to show how strong they are." Says he: "Tell me, my good republican brother (in which he gravely erred) if we, the 9000 republican voters of the city of Spokane, come from a district that is too evil to mention?" This right I shall not attempt to deny to any party, but let us see if his statement will hold water. I shall ask the gentleman to explain this political phenomena. Two years ago Barth precinct gave the democratic candidate 111 votes, the republican 43. Brickel precinct gave the democratic candidate 103 votes, the republican 43. Brown gave the democratic candidate 110 votes, the republican 26.

Now let us turn to the recent primaries and see if those precincts are democratic or republican. Barth precinct gave Messrs. Pratt and Laumer a combined vote of seven and Mr. Omo 86. Brickel precinct gave to Pratt and Laumer a combined vote of 10, Mr. Omo 81. Brown gave to Pratt and Laumer a combined vote of 14, and 83 for Mr. Omo. Very respectfully, Russell E. Collins.
