

SALOONS GET TIME TO CUT OUT SCREENS

Chief of Police Sullivan, Commissioner Tuerke and Prosecuting Attorney Fred C. Pugh will be busy tonight and tomorrow night going about Spokane's numerous saloons, laying down the law abolishing screens from in front of the bars. Every saloon keeper in the city will be ordered to comply with this new state law.

A few pencil marks on the original form of this bill, such as seems to be practically all embodied in the statute at the present time, are authoritatively stated to have been ignored by the legislature. Certain parts of the bill were penciled when it was before the house by representatives of the saloon forces, it is declared, to alter its meaning to the extent that the inside of barrooms should be exposed only during closing hours. There is no doubt about the meaning of the law as it appears in the new codes. The screens must come down for all the time.

To comply with this law several of the most exclusive saloons in the city must be extensively altered. Some of them are approached only through long area ways and the view of the inside of them is shut off by cigar stores.

Cigar stores all over the city will be affected by the Sunday closing law and the bulk of the Sunday cigar trade will be thrown to a few of the cigar stores lucky enough to be outside of saloons. Whole lower floors of some of the best buildings in town must be remodeled and new doors cut through their walls in order that some of the cigar stores may continue to do business on Sunday.

Under the new law, all saloons, together with the saloon restaurants and the cigar stores situated in the same rooms, or separated by a screen but entered through the same door that affords egress to the saloons, must close at 12 o'clock Saturday night. They will be allowed under the city ordinance to open at midnight Sunday to run till 2 o'clock Monday morning, the regular daily closing hour. Then they must be closed till 5:30 in the morning.

The law against saloon screens should have gone in effect today; but Pugh, Sullivan and Tuerke were unable to get together till last night.

LABOR

The final curtain fell in the great seven years' struggle between the Mine Operators' association and the Western Federation of Miners, when the Colorado legislature passed the appropriation bill a few days ago, when contained provisions to partially reimburse the miners who suffered damages during the "Peabody war." Without an exception this contest was the most bitter and uncompromising that ever has been waged between labor and capital on this continent. Its cost mounted high into the millions of dollars.

On the one side stood the Mine Operators association, assisted by Standard Oil's untold wealth, the smelter combine, railways, etc.; the governor, the high courts, the militia, several detective and strike-breaking agencies, the Citizens alliance, with a few notable exceptions the daily newspapers of the country, and even President Roosevelt and other Washington officials threw their immense power and influence to the support of the employers.

On the other side stood the Western Federation of Miners with its back to the wall, grim and determined, resolved to fight to the last ditch to preserve its entity and safeguard the rights of its membership. Financially, the miners were forced to depend upon the small contributions of their fellow workmen and sympathizers, and the tired union press.

From the day that the men struck in Colorado City, in 1902, to compel the enforcement of the eight-hour law in mines and smelters, as voted by the people of Colorado in a referendum, down to the culmination of the celebrated trials in Boise, not a single charge laid at the doors of the miners by the operators and their press, politicians and Pinkertons has been substantiated in court.

WANTS DIVORCE BECAUSE SHE HAD TO FEED HER FAMILY ON STOLEN FOOD

husband refused to support her and at one time deserted her. She wants their three children and \$1,500 community property.

HEADS BOYS IN GRAY



GENERAL CLEMENT A. EVANS.

General Clement A. Evans of Atlanta, Ga., commander in chief of the confederate veterans, is the big figure in the annual encampment of the men in gray. Additional prominence rests on him in view of the possibility that the confederate and union veterans may hold a union encampment next year.

General Evans, born in Georgia, studied law, and was a judge and state senator when the great struggle broke out. He enlisted and went up rapidly; major, colonel, brigadier general. In the Spanish war he was made major general of a division.

After the war General Evans settled down to his legal practice and literary pursuits. He was elected commander of the confederates in 1908.

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
