Frequently the expression is heard at the ball ground, "That fellow's a fast thinker." Just for a moment, consider how fast some players really do think.

For instance, suppose a runner is on second base in a tight game with two men out and the man at bat singles sharply over second, the second baseman knocking down the ball, but not holding it.

The batter has been springing for first since the crack of the bat, but the man on second has to hesitate until he is sure the ball is not caught.

Between the time the ball is hit and knocked down 115 or 120 feet away perhaps four-fifths of a second elapse. In this time the fielder's brain gets this: "I can't get the man going to first, but the man on second must wait to see if I catch the ball. If I don't, he will go to third, so the thing to do is to throw to third as soon as I get hold of the ball."

His first thought was direction, his second thought speed and his third whether he should back up or come in on the ball to get it. He knew the runner would get to first in less than four seconds, while if he knocked the ball down, recovered it, turned and threw, he would not get him. Then he thought of the man going to third, and figured he could get him if the third baseman attended to business.

It is fast thinking, isn't it?


THE WISCONSIN VARSITY GOING SOME.

WHIPSAW STEAL IS GIANTS NEW PLAY

The very latest base ball stunt as worked by McGraw's merry men is a base stealing trick known as the "whipsaw steal." It is generally tried when two are out, with men on first and third. The Giants pulled it off on Pittsburgh, catching Abstein and Wagner, and tying the score. The thing was picked up in Marlin, Texas, last spring and was kept under cover until needed.

The play depends upon the runner on first leading off so far that he draws a throw from the pitcher. The moment the pitcher makes the first move to throw to first the runner dashes for second. Naturally the pitcher throws to save a balk being called. The first baseman nine times out of 10 throws to second to catch the runner. Meanwhile the runner on third has been edging along slowly, but not showing a sign of going home until the first baseman starts his throw to second.

The moment the first base guard does throw, however, the runner on third springs for the plate and is almost certain to score, for the double throw cannot beat him. Meanwhile, it is up to the man going to second to stop in his tracks long enough to permit the man to score before he is retired. Of course, if the first baseman is wise and whips the ball to third instead of to second he is apt to get the runner off third, retiring the side.
