

RUSH FOR LAND IN WANE

NOTARIES HANDLED THOUSANDS ON FIRST DAY—SPOKANE PEOPLE NOT YET IN EVIDENCE AS FUTURE FARMERS.

A wife and husband cannot both register for chances in the Indian reservation land drawing. The husband only can register unless he is incapacitated. A woman who is the head of a family has as much right in the drawings as any other citizen.

The backbone of the work of registering applicants for land chances on the Spokane reservation was apparently broken by the big rush yesterday, when more than 8,000 took the oath before Spokane notaries. Today the application business is dull with notaries up in the buildings, although those on first floors are finding considerable to do.

The majority of people who applied yesterday were from outside points, some of them coming from as far as Pennsylvania. A heavy registration has been expected from Spokane, but local people are not greatly in evidence yet. This may be due to the fact that they who live in the city have paid closer attention to the published explanations of the land drawing rules and realize that they will stand just as good a chance by waiting and registering at leisure.

It is also likely that Spokane people are satisfied that they are in the best place on earth already and can't better their condition no matter where they go.


