Then Brinker came to the bat and knocked a hot one over first base, scoring Burnett. Altman came to the bat and lambasted a two base hit over second base, bringing in Brinker, and here the scoring ended.

Brinker's hit, which won the game for Spokane in the fifth inning, caused the sensation of the game. The ball rolled right along the first base line and some alleged that it was a foul, but Umpire Drennan thought different.



WORLD'S LONGEST SHOT PUT



RALPH ROSE, BREAKING HIS OWN WORLD'S RECORD IN THE SHOT-PUT AT THE RECENT A. A. U. NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP FIELD MEET AT SEATTLE.

Rose realized his long cherished ambition of putting the shot over 50 feet by hurling the 16 pound weight 50 feet 3 inches. His former record was 49 feet 10 inches. The rosy cheeked giant from California was the individual star of the meet, winning three first places and two seconds for his club, the Olympic club of San Francisco. He took first in the shot-put, discus and javelin, and second in the hammer and 56 pound weight, winning a total of 21 points.

SMITHSON CONQUERS SHAW

Kranslein, the Pennsylvania star of years ago. In the Seattle race Smithson had Shaw, the record holder, beaten by eight good feet at the top. Shaw, who represented the Chicago Athletic club, is shown right behind Smithson in the photograph, and W. Edwards of the Seattle A. C., who finished third, is at the extreme left of the picture.
