REFUSES CHLOROFORM UNTIL HE CAN TALK WITH MOTHER

CLEVELAND, Aug. 30.—Thoughts of his mother and a penny debt he owed came to Edward Corrigan, age 14, as he lay dying under an Erie freight train at the foot of Riverside avenue.

"I don't want mamma to know I'm hurt, May," said the lad to his 16-year-old sister, as she knelt over his mangled body. "Don't tell her until I am in the hospital. Don't forget to pay Mrs. Gallagher a penny. I owe it to her. Tell Moran to hold up my head and please May, tell 'em to hurry and get the wheel off my stomach."

The lad was conscious and talking of his mother and playmates until an anaesthetic was administered at St. John's hospital, where he was taken in an ambulance. He died at 6 a. m. today.

He had been playing in the railroad yards all afternoon. Finally he climbed on the top of a coal car with John Moran, age 21. He was bumped off and struck the ground on his head, his body falling across the track. He was dragged 150 feet. His legs and the lower part of his body were crushed.

Moran made an effort to save young Corrigan's life, and ran along the track, trying to pull his body from beneath the wheels and please May, tell 'em to hurry and get the wheel off my stomach."

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RAILWAY FIGHT AGAIN POSTPONED

The many-cornered fight over the Inland Empire railway's application for permission to change its transfer track connection with the Northern Pacific was postponed last night by the city council until September 20, at the urgent request of Attorney Dudley of the Milwaukee road. The Spokane Toilet Supply Co., the Schade brewery, the city and at least two private property owners are also interested in this move of the Inland. The Milwaukee seems to be the most vitally interested, as the grade of the proposed transfer track may affect their entrance into the city to a great extent. Attorney Dudley told the council that his company was willing to meet the Milwaukee's half way, and an effort will be made in the meantime to adjust the conflicting interests of the two railways.

INVISIBLE ORGANISMS.
PARIS, Aug. 31.—In a paper read before the Paris academy of sciences, Monsieur Chauveau shows that the organism which the effects of ordinary vaccine are due to is still unknown, being beyond the

scope. Its properties are not understood, however, but it is proved that it contains crystalline or colloidal matter when vaccine is covered with a thin layer of oil and allowed to diffuse, the latter is absorbed to the upper layers of the skin. Monsieur Chauveau regards as certain that the organism is a living being.

PREDICTS 6,605,000 POPULATION FOR N. Y.
Comptroller Says It Grows Faster Than Any Other City.
NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—In the current number of Pearson's magazine under the title "New York in the Chrysalis," Herman A. Metz, comptroller of the currency of Greater New York, declares that in 1926 the population of the city will be 6,605,000. Metz points out that New York city is growing faster than any other part of the country, being 40 times as populous as it was 100 years ago, while the rest of the country has increased but fifteenfold.

SHIPS TO FORECAST WEATHER
WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 31.—Wireless on the water may soon be obligatory. Professor Willis L. Moore, chief of the U. S. weather bureau, has urged the necessity of adopting regulations which will compel a ship beyond a certain tonnage to carry wireless instruments and operators to take at noon, Greenwich time, a daily observation of the weather. Observations received by ship could be transmitted to other vessels so that by means of such relays the weather conditions over the entire ocean would in a few minutes reach the central meteorological offices in the United States, England, France, Germany and other interested nations. Forecasts would then be distributed to the vessels by wireless telegraph.
