

In the first game at Natatorium park, Brownlee defeated Doods, 7 to 6. Doods have been playing good ball until lately, but yesterday they showed very bad form.



retary and president, he dreamed of the day when baseball would be undecorated head, working on economical business like lines.

Ten years back there was no baseball bibliography. Farrell gathered data. He stored facts on every angle, from the standpoint of player, owner and spectator. He knows the law from the coming 1910 rules to the M-in division of Pitcher's contract.

Farrell has made baseball law. He has interpreted it. He has administered it. As legislator, lawyer and judge, he has become the supreme court of the game.

Since he organized it 12 years ago, Farrell has been president, secretary-treasurer of the New York State league. Even then he dreamed. He saw leagues organized yearly, only to blow up. Play-

ers and managers were transient. Discipline was unknown. The national agreement, governed, operated by a committee of national leaguers, who let the minors drift.


In 1901 the baseball structure trembled. Realizing cooperation was necessary, Farrell and 10 other-league presidents met in Chicago and formed the national association, which today governs 95 per cent of baseball.

The national agreement was abrogated. Farrell, whose knowledge and grasp of detail gave him precedence, was elected secretary-treasurer of the N. A. P. B. L., a position he has held continuously. The snarled skeins were straightened out quickly and the association prospered. Today only the majors and the coast outlaws are without the pale.


