## INDIANS HERE WITH TURKS TOMORROW

## CUBS REFUSE TO PLAY, FORFEIT GAME; THREE TIE FOR PENNANT

### COURTS MAY TAKE A HAND IN LEAGUE MUDDLE

True to his threats, Manager Campbell of the Hillyard Cubs, failed to show up in Natatorium park yesterday afternoon with his team to play off a postponed game with the Brownies, as ordered by President Lloyd of the City league. As a result, Lloyd has declared the game forfeited to the Brownies by a score of 9 to 0, and three teams, the Brownies, Varneys and the Cubs, are tied for first place and the city league pennant. Campbell threatens to throw the case into the courts to decide the real winners of the pennant, and the Varneys are muttering threats along similar lines.

President Lloyd charges that

Campbell was given an opportunity to set a date to play the postponed game before the close of the season, but failed to do so. Campbell's contention now is that Lloyd has not the right to set a date after the close of the season for postponed games to be played.

A good sized crowd gathered at the park to see the finish game between the Brownies and the Hillyard Cubs and one between the winners and the Varneys to decide the City league championship. They were much disappointed, but were partially consoled with an exhibition game between the Varneys and Brownies, which ended in an 8 to 3 score victory for the Brownies.


## KETCHEL IS GOING TO ROAST BEEF LAND

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—Whether or not Jack Johnson succeeds in his endeavor to knock out Stanley Smashabit Ketchel on the 16th of this month, Willis Britz, the faithful guardian of the Michigan's interests, declares that he will take his spectacular boxer to Europe this winter, there to glean the dollars which sundry second-raters, such as Joe Jeannette and Sam McVey, have left for the legitimate top-notchers to cop off from the fight-lovers of the other side. In an interview yesterday Willis confided to the writer that he had

received many flattering offers from England, France, and even sunny Italy, all of which were sent with the full knowledge that Ketchel expected to box Johnson, and none of them contingent on the outcome of that affair.

"Ketchel and I will leave soon after the Johnson affair," declared Willis, "and will spend probably six months or more in the land of frogs and rare roast beef, returning in plenty of time to meet any of these big fellows who think they have a chance to annex either the water, middle or heavy weight championship. We will have every one of these tucked away in our inside vest pockets, too, in spite of all the funny stories that are going around about this big coon and my little whirlwind. I know that a champion would do well to stay in his own country for a while, but Stan has made up his mind that he wants to see Europe, so we'll be off after we have cleared the atmosphere of this big dinge. ## PLAYING FOOTBALL



**SEVENTH ARTICLE.**  
This is a quick mass play on right of center.  
Center blocks opposing center to left.  
Left guard helps throw opposing center to left.  
Right guard blocks out opposing guard to right.  
Left tackle breaks through and cuts off opposing halfback and helps runner.  
Right tackle assists in throwing out opposing left guard.  
Left end comes around fast and pushes from behind.  
Right end blocks out opposing tackle, goes through and helps runner.  
Quarterback passes ball to fullback (black circle), then helps hold him up and carry him forward.  
Left halfback assists runner on left hip.  
Right halfback assists runner on right hip.  
Fullback takes ball, goes in low and hard to keep his feet as long as possible.



## DAILY LESSON IN BILLIARDS

Diagram 1.—Cue ball 1/2 below, object ball 15-16 left; stroke medium, carom on ball 2. Ball 1 will gather on ball 2. A wrist stroke. An easy, direct draw.



## DRAW AND FOLLOW SHOTS

Diagram 2.—Cue ball 1/2 below, object ball 3/4 right; stroke medium; carom on ball 2, gathering ball 1 in corner with 2. An easy quarter spread draw.  
Diagram 3.—Cue ball 1/2 below, object ball 15-16 left; stroke ordinary; effecting carom on ball 2. Long draw stroke.  
Diagram 4.—Cue ball 1/2 above, 1/2 left, object ball 3/4 right; stroke medium. Ball 1 returns from end cushion and gathers with ball 2. Follow gathering stroke.  
Diagram 5.—Cue ball 1/2 above, 1/2 left, object ball 1/2 right; stroke ordinary; carom on ball 2, ball 1 gathering with 2 in corner. A follow stroke driving ball round table.

Clynes found him so well in the seventh as to whack one over the left field fence for a home run, putting the Spokane team one in the lead. Bennet walked in the eighth, then tied up the score again, with the aid of hits by Lynch and Frisk, by a score of 3 to 3.

Baker pitched a fairly good game for Spokane and Thompson was all but invincible up till the sixth, when Altman, Wood and Norydke fell on his neck for two runs that tied up the score the first time.

Tensen was in the box for Spokane against Miller of the Turks in the first game, but he did not have the support from the infield that was given Miller and the game was lost to Spokane by a score of 3 to 1.

Both teams left Seattle last night to come to Spokane, where they will play the seventh game of the post-season series Tuesday.

## WIFE WITH FORK SAVES HUSBAND FROM MAD BULL

CHARDON, Ohio, Oct. 9.—Chas. Russell, a farmer near Fullerton, Geauga county, who was attacked Sunday by a bull, owes his life to his wife. She went to his rescue at her own peril and drove off the animal with a pitchfork.

Russell was leading the bull across the barnyard when it rushed at him. With one lunge it closed the length of the leading strap and butted Russell to the ground. Then, following, it bent to gore him.

Russell took hold of the ring in the bull's nose with both hands and twisted it so that the animal missed its blow. He clung to the ring and the bull began dragging him around the barnyard.

Mrs. Russell got a pitchfork and rammed the long tines repeatedly into the beast's flanks before she succeeded in diverting its anger from her husband.

Floyd Mansfield, a neighboring farmer, seized the leading strap as Russell, exhausted, let go the bull ring, and, aided by Mrs. Russell, steered the animal into the barn and slammed the door.

Russell had three broken ribs.
