## LITTLE WOMAN SWIMS LIKE SEAL; WANTS TO RACE ANNETTE KELLERMAN

This little woman—she is only five feet two inches—says Annette Kellermann isn't the world's champion swimmer, as she happens to hold that title herself, and as she has never met defeat refuses to admit the Australian girl has anything on her in a national way.

The little woman is Miss Ellen Foulds. She hails from England, where she learned to swim when she was but nine. She comes from a family of swimmers, six sisters being experts in the water. She has raced all over continental Europe in events ranging from 100 yards to 10 miles and holds a high record of 126 feet.

"I won the championship in England and have a medal to prove it," said Miss Foulds. "I am ready at any time to defend the title against Miss Kellermann or any other woman."

Among her performances Miss Foulds can boast of 100 yards in one minute and 11 seconds; a mile in salt water in 29:34; 180 yards in which she turned 14 complete somersaults and won by 30 yards, in 2:20; two miles in a rough sea in 30:59; one mile inside 30 minutes in a 25-yard tank; 100 yards to beat one minute and 17 seconds; four miles in a heavy sea in 58 minutes.

Miss Foulds has been in this country about a year, giving exhibitions, chiefly in Canada. It is probable she will appear in New York in the near future, meeting comers in a series of races, and when not racing will give exhibitions of fancy swimming and high diving.

## PIRATES DEFEAT DETROIT 8-6

In one of the hardest fought battles ever held on a baseball field, Pittsburg won from Detroit by a score of 8 to 6 in the world's series games at Detroit, yesterday afternoon. The game was played in a steady downpour of rain. Pittsburg took the lead from the start, scoring five runs in the first inning; they took still another in the second; then was begun a spectacular fight to even the score by the Detroit team. The great grand stand was packed with more than 18,000 persons and enthusiasm ran high in spite of the almost intolerable weather conditions on the diamond.

Hans Wagner seemed to take to the rain like a duck and made himself the hero of the game, taking four hits, one of them a double, stealing five bases and accepting seven chances in the field. Five pitchers and three umpires were used in the trying game. Summers, Willett, Works and Mullen occupying the box for Detroit, against Maddox of the Pirates.
