Spokane fans will have their first opportunity to witness big league stars in action when Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics, the contenders in the American league bunting race, hook up with the All Stars, All Nationals, or California Nationals, as they are variously called.

The coming of the big leaguers is the talk of local fandom, and in addition to the regulars, excursions will bring in many hundreds of fans from neighboring towns.

The first game will be played Sunday afternoon, with Monday as the date of the second and final exhibition. The Athletics will probably bring their full lineup to the coast, while the personnel of the All Stars is not definitely known.

Oh, you Warriors. That post-season finish could not be beaten anywhere.

Jess Baker showed himself to be some classy heaver when he copped those two events yesterday afternoon. He allowed only nine safeties in the sixteen rounds and passed only three Turks.

Fielding stunts were pulled off yesterday afternoon that will bear comparison with the best that the big leaguers can do here next Sunday.

Baseball has been relegated to the background for several months, or will be after the Philadelphia Athletics and the California All Stars put on their little matinees.

Manager Hen Berry of the Los Angeles Coasters objects to his men playing winter ball, claiming that it impairs their efficiency for the succeeding season. He declares that if any of his men fail to get into condition within a reasonable time next spring that he will cut their salaries.

A movement is on foot to pit the Seals, the prospective winners of the Coaster pennant, against Oakland, the winner of the California Outlaw bunting. With such men as Henderson, Moskman, Hackett, "Hap" Smith, Jimmy McHale, Tommy Sheehan and Joe Nealon in the Outlaw lineup, there are many fans who believe that Cy Moring's crew could worst the Coast champs. The series may be played in November, following the Athletic-All National mixups in the bay section.

Right field—Cobb, Detroit. Catcher—Gibson, Pittsburg. Pitcher—Mathewson, New York Nationals. The same writer picks Harry Krause to pitch for his second team, and Chance to play first base.

The last time Honus Wagner played in the world's championship games he made but two hits in the first three games and stole but one base. This time he has made six hits in the first three games and has about six stolen bases to his credit.

IDENTIFY BODY OF A MURDERED GIRL

TIVERTON, R. I., Oct. 18.—Mrs. Sarah Grinnell of Fall River, Mass., identified the dismembered body of the young woman found near here as being that of her step-daughter, Julia R. Grinnell. Surgeons who performed an autopsy on the body declared that they had found evidences of an attempted illegal operation.

The police have been making an effort to clear up the case since last Monday afternoon, when the left leg and part of the right were found by a rural letter carrier. Tuesday the corpse was found, exactly a mile from where the legs were found, and yesterday, with the exception of the head, the remaining parts of the body were found. The head is still missing.


