

PROSECUTE GORDON ON AN INFORMATION

Prosecutor Pugh Says He Will Not Quit the Fight—Replies to R. B. Martin.

In a statement issued today, Fred C. Pugh, prosecuting attorney, announces that he will soon file an information in the most important of the Gordon cases and ask to have the case set for trial at the February term of court.

Mr. Pugh says that all of the Gordon and Schively cases will be tried during the next three months. His statement, issued in reply to R. B. Martin's letter in The Press yesterday, reads:

"To the Editor of The Press: On R. B. Martin, said to live at Opportunity, has been trying, for reasons of his own, to cause the readers of The Press to believe that the grand jury cases against Judge Gordon, Great Northern railway attorney, J. H. Schively, state insurance commissioner, and the trustees of the Pacific Live Stock association, are barred and cannot now be prosecuted because they were not brought to trial within 60 days from the date of the indictments.
