(By United Press Leased Wire.) INDIANAPOLIS, April 19.—"Gray matter instead of red fire is solving the question of the times. Party lines were never so loose as they are now," declared Gov. Thomas R. Marshall of Indiana, whose boom for the democratic nomination for the presidency was launched at a Jefferson day banquet here. "Reason campaigns are less spectacular, but they bring better results."

Governor Marshall is urging today his plan to have the democratic state convention, which convenes April 27, nominate the party candidate for the United States senate. There is strong opposition to this plan in the party here, but Marshall is using his influence to compel such action.

# 40 MEN KILLED IN LANDSLIDE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) QUEBEC, April 19.—Forty men were killed in the landslide which caught a work train on the Grand Trunk Pacific yesterday, according to reports which have just reached here.

Eight bodies have been recovered and those working in the mass of earth and boulders expect soon to unearth more corpses.

The men killed were workmen on a ballast train. A mountain of sand and rocks swept down upon them and buried them in the bottom of a creek 75 feet below a bridge over which the train was running at the time of the slide.

# HEIRESS IS LOCATED BY THE PRESS

Through an article published yesterday in The Press telling of the search that was being made for Barbara Linder, who had inherited a considerable sum of money, which was being held for her in the bank of Elkhart Lake, Wis., the heiress was located at 412 Xenia street last night. The woman read the article from The Press and hastened to the police station, where she was placed in possession of all information that the authorities had concerning her inheritance.

She is heiress to the money as the wife of Philip Muroch, deceased.

# BIG QUAKE IN MEXICO

(By United Press Leased Wire.) MEXICO CITY, April 19.—Heavy damage was done in the city of Mexico by a series of earthquakes on April 8, according to advices that reached here today. The tremblers were reported to have been more severe than those which razed the city a year ago, and which caused the death of 100 persons.

Three score adobe buildings were leveled by the later shocks. The people were panic stricken, hundreds leaving the city and camping in the open country.

# HYDE DEFENSE HAS INNING

(By United Press Leased Wire.) KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 19.—The defense of Dr. B. C. Hyde, charged with the murder of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, had its inning today.

Attorney Frank P. Walsh for the defense began his opening argument with the contention that cyanide of potassium had been injected into the body of Colonel Swope while it lay in a cemetery vault. He declared that the tomb of the millionaire philanthropist had been desecrated, the casket tipped open and the body tampered with.

"The body of Colonel Swope was left in such a state by those who rifled the vault, that it froze. We intend to show that interested persons had put poison in Colonel Swope's veins either at the vault, the catacomb or the morgue," said Walsh.

The death of Dr. G. T. Twyman adds another name to the list of those connected with the Swope family who have suffered illness and died.

# CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY IN GIRL CASE

Charges of conspiracy to illegally deprive himself and wife of the custody of Ruth Wainbush, colored, age 13, and to give her into the care of Policeman Walter Lawson and his wife, are made today by the Rev. J. Gordon McPherson, colored, against Lawson and Probation Officer J. E. Harmon. McPherson and his wife were haled to court this morning as the result of their reluctance in assenting to a search warrant with which Harmon and other officers came to his house yesterday, in an effort to secure the clothing of the Mainbush girl, which Mrs. McPherson is alleged to have refused to deliver to Lawson, whose home the girl is now stopping.

The Wainbush girl was given into the care of the colored pastor and his wife several months ago by order of Judge J. D. Hinkle. The Lawsons have long sought to adopt the child. A short time ago, it is parted temporarily and the girl was declared. McPherson and his wife placed in the juvenile detention rooms and Officer Lawson was notified, with the result that he immediately took steps to adopt her and took her home with him.

Subsequently, it is stated that McPherson and his wife were reconciled. McPherson stated that he communicated with Probation Officer Harmon and asked if they were planning to take the girl from their care and he declares that Harmon denied that anything of that nature was on foot.

# RELATIVE OF WASHINGTON SUICIDES

EAST ORANGE, N. J., April 19.—Word reached this city today of the suicide at the Morris Plains hospital for the insane, of Miss Ida Bowen, who was a relative of George Washington and a great granddaughter of Madam Jumel of Revolutionary fame. Miss Bowen was highly educated and the daughter of wealthy parents, but after their death her resources failed and she went insane from brooding over an unfortunate love affair. Her body was taken to Providence, R. I., where she was born, for burial.

# SAYS EVERY CIVIL WAR VETERAN WILL BE DEAD BY THE YEAR 1928

CHICAGO, April 19.—Civil war veterans of Chicago today are compelled to face the fact that inside of 18 years they are all supposed to be dead. They were told this at a meeting of the directors of the Chicago public library, to discuss the extension of the Memorial association's lease of Grand Army Memorial hall.

The present lease extends to 1928, but members of the association asked for an extension of 20 years. Frederick H. Rawson, director, gave the old veterans food for thought when he said:

"By 1928 all the old soldiers will be gone. We are required to maintain the hall as a memorial, but are not obliged to turn it over to any one association to which the living members of the G. A. R. may have assigned it, after they expire it will be the time enough to consider a new one."

# HORSE ON THE RAMPAGE

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, April 19.—Having wrecked a trolley car, smashed a wagon into splinters, injured five men and held up a Big Four train, a horse ended his spectacular career here last night by being killed with a pick and buried in the Mad river. The horse was originally attached to the wagon in which were seated five men. It started on its spree by backing the wagon into a traction car, one side of which it demolished. It then kicked the wagon to pieces and distributed its five occupants in various parts of the road, two of them being seriously hurt. Freed of wagon, the horse dashed along a railroad trestle, where it fell with a broken leg in front of an oncoming train.

# SENATOR HALE IS TO RETIRE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, April 19.—It was authentically announced here today that Senator Eugene Hale of Maine will retire at the end of his present term, March 3, 1911. Although the news was a surprise to some of his colleagues, some of his intimate friends have known for several days that he had reached this decision.

Senator Hale is 74 years old. He is the ranking member of the senate, having served since March 4, 1881, the longest continuous service of any member of the upper house of congress. Senator Frye of Rhode Island began their service in the same year, but did not take their seats on the opening day of congress.

Senator Hale is ill at his home here. His health has not been good for some time past and physicians advised him against entering another campaign.

"I will not be lonesome, even outside the senate," Hale is reported to have told his old friends, a little wistfully. "There are many things I would like to have time to do."

# ETAMPES IS AVIATION CENTER

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PARIS, April 19.—Etampes, in the flat Beauce country, between Fontainebleau and Chartres, due south of Paris, is supplanting in popularity as an aviation center the most famous training ground for flying men in the world, Mournelon Le Grand, or Chalons, as it is called.

At this latter place, Farman, Voisin, the Antoinette people and all the princely aviators, builders and flyers, established shops and training buildings. But with the swarm of pupils from Germany especially, the French government got cold feet and ordered the aviators not to leave the field. Cross country flights were ordered discontinued. For there are many factories and military headquarters in the vicinity, and France, as it is, literally swarms with German spies. Etampes is therefore gradually taking the place of Chalons.

# SHAKESPEARE WEEK HAS BEGUN; MANTELL HERE

Before a fair-sized audience last night Robert Mantell opened his week of Shakespeare in Spokane at the Auditorium. Shakespeare's great psychological tragedy, Macbeth, was the play given, and that Mr. Mantell's mastery portrayal of the red-handed, weak purposed though ambitious Thane of Cawdor was thoroughly appreciated as attested by the curtain calls after every act.

The Lady Macbeth of Miss Marie Booth Russell gave splendid support to the leading role. Miss Russell is a fine elocutionist and she is capable of expressing emotion in her face and by gesture probably as vividly as some of the greatest delineators of the part in the past. She shared the curtain calls with Mantell.

The scenes in the great tragedy between Macbeth and Lady Macbeth were splendidly handled. The greeting of the two when the Thane returns to Cawdor with the news that the king is to stop there that night and the first broaching then of the damnable plot to slay him, as well as the other scenes between the two in the banquet hall—when Banquo's ghost appears—and when Macbeth puts aside the blood-stained crown he has won, were an interpretation of the great poet's lines as real and convincing, perhaps, as can be seen anywhere on the stage today.
