BRING IN SULLIVAN, OFFICERS AND ALSO JUDGE S. A. MANN

Charge Immorality, Condoning of Offense by Chief, Conspiracy in Police Court.

To N. S. Pratt, Mayor; The Board of Police Commissioners, and The City Council, of the City of Spokane, Wash. Gentlemen:—We, the undersigned, hereby prefer charges against John T. Sullivan, acting chief of police; S. A. Mann, police judge; L. H. Gilder, regular police officer, and H. W. Hood, special officer, of the Spokane police department.
