Beavers Defeat Indians, 4-2

BATTRIES FOR TODAY: SPOKANE--KILLILAY AND OSTDIK VANCOUVER--JENSEN AND LEWIS

Before a large weekday crowd, plentifully besprinkled with femininity--today being ladies' day--the Indians again this afternoon faced the Beavers at Recreation park, determined to retrieve lost honors and even up the score. The principal change in the local lineup was the removal of Pendry at second, the substitution of Cartwright at that position and the putting of Granville, originally intended for the place, in the game at shortstop. Pendry, who made errors galore yesterday, went to the bench. The day was too windy for good, fast ball, and the players were more or less hampered throughout the game. "I SAID I WOULD WIN, AND I DID"

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, April 28.--Claude G. White, the aviator, beaten by Louis Paulhan in his flight from London to Manchester, reconsidered his determination not to complete the flight and ascended at Polesworth at 5:02 o'clock this afternoon. White was forced to abandon his flight this morning when he struck adverse air currents at Polesworth. He was flying 200 feet high near the start and was making rapid time. "I said I would win, and I did," was Paulhan's comment today. "I am sorry the cold prevented my winning without stopping. I have the highest admiration for White's pluck." Although the public was somewhat aggrieved because of Paulhan's minute lead in the race, both aviators declare today that the contest was honestly run. No unwarranted advantage was taken by either man, it is stated. White, at the earliest opportunity, wired his heartiest congratulations to Paulhan. The best man won, he said. The Mail sent congratulations to Paulhan and White. "Cordial congratulations to Paulhan, mingled with sincere sympathy for White, his gallant rival," the message read.

SEATTLE BOXERS ARE HERE FOR S. A. A. C. SMOKER TOMORROW
