A fair sized and enthusiastic crowd of fans turned out today to see the next to the last game of the present series between Spokane and Tacoma. The weather was favorable, and although there was a light wind blowing it did not interfere with good work on the part of the players.

Rockenfield flew out to Davis; Mott fouled out to catcher; Basse doubled to right field; Hartman was out to Cartwright.

Davis, first man up for Spokane, was sacrificed to second by Cartwright, but Butler retired the next two men up.

**SECOND INNING.**

Stevens was hit by pitcher; Jansing sacrificed him to second, but went out, Cartwright to Nordyke; Byrnes flew out to Kippert.

Nordyke and Flood were both retired; Coleman to Mott; Ostdiek was hit by pitcher and stole second; Granville hit by pitcher; Bonner out, Coleman to Mott.

**THIRD INNING.**

Butler flew out to Davis; Rockenfield singled to right field, stole second and scored on Ostdiek's bad throw to second; Mott singled and went out a moment later on first base, when Basse drove a liner to Cartwright's mitt, who made it a double.

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### CORONATION WILL BE IN DECEMBER

"I Know This Is the End, Tell the Queen," Edward's Last Words ---George Timid About Reign.

(By United Press Leased Wire) LONDON, May 7.—The new king and queen of England, showing traces of their long vigil at the bedside of the late king, made their first public appearance today when they drove from Marlborough House to the palace. Thousands of persons who had gathered about the palace in silent tribute to the memory of the monarch whose body lay in state within, greeted the royal couple with silence. The king and queen were dressed in deepest mourning. The equipment of the carriage in which they rode was of sombre hue. The faces of both showed traces of a terrible mental and physical strain, and expressions of sympathy were heard as the vehicle moved along.

Every head in the vast throng was bared as the king and queen passed by.

Among the thousands of messages that have been received since King Edward's death was one of condolence from President Taft of the United States and another from President Fallieres of France.

The coronation of the king and Knollys, and the formal announcement was made by the new king, George V, in a message to the Lord Mayor.

Death was caused by constant coughing from bronchitis, which affected the heart. The left ventricle failed to act even under oxygen.

His last illness revealed the king's real strength of character, which had characterized him through life. He discussed his approaching death calmly and several times he sat up to give important instructions on state affairs.

He suffered greatly from coughing, but bore the pain bravely.

It is reported today that the physicians were hopeful until 10 o'clock last night. But at that hour the change for the worse came and an hour and 45 minutes later the king passed away.

**CROWNED IN 1901.**  
 Edward VII ascended the throne upon the death of his mother, Queen Victoria, January 22, 1901. He was born in Buckingham palace Nov. 9, 1841, and was christened Albert Edward, prince of Wales, receiving the name of Albert after his father and Edward after his

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## KING GEORGE TAKES THE DUAL OATH

LONDON, May 7.—George V was formally proclaimed king of England this evening from the quadrangle of St. James palace.

The privy council met at the palace and formally declared Edward dead. Then the government leaders at once vested King George in the adjoining room.

The lord chancellor administered the dual oath of England and Scotland. Impressive silence on the part of his hearers marked the responses of the new king.

The ruler then announced himself as George V, and the heir apparent, Prince Edward, stepped forward and received the oath of succession.

Sir Alfred Scott-Gatty, knight at arms of the Knights of the Garter, appeared in the quadrangle and read the proclamation of a new king reigning in England.

Then followed the fanfare of trumpets, the presentation of arms by the assembled troops and a

## COUNCIL WILL PASS RAILROAD FRANCHISES

By a Vote of 7 to 3, Way Is Paved for Passage Without Terminal Rates.

### FINAL DISCUSSION TUESDAY

President E. V. Lambert of the city council said this morning that the reconsideration of the Milwaukee and North Coast franchises will be resumed Tuesday night, May 17, and that if an agreement is reached on all matters he presumed the franchises will be passed by the council.

By a vote of seven to three the city council last night paved the way for the passage of the franchises of the Milwaukee and North Coast railways. After another night of oratory, the council voted to rescind its former action demanding the granting of terminal rates and on May 17 will resume the consideration of the franchises where the matter was dropped about two months ago. This means that when the council and the railroads get together on the matters of union depot and street vacations, a common user clause that the franchises will be passed. The advocates of terminal rates can then

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
