BRIGHT LITTLE NEWS ITEMS WHICH SHOW JUST WHAT SPOKANE IS DOING

Without waiting to remove his street clothes, T. G. Cook, manager of the swimming pool at Natatorium park, jumped into the tank and rescued a small boy, who, not being able to swim, was struggling helplessly in the water.

After partaking in the Memorial day services, and meeting his old comrades for the last time, James Shields, a hero of the civil war, has answered the last roll call and died at the Sacred Heart hospital last Saturday night of apoplexy. The dead veteran has lived in Spokane for many years and is well known here.

An automobile driven by R. B. Warren struck G. Byrn and his two little girls, 5 and 7 years old, living at 6238 Princeton avenue, and knocked the girls to the pavement at Post and Front avenue yesterday afternoon. But outside of a few scratches they were not hurt.

Harvey Holson, 15 years old, living with his parents at 301 Alta avenue, was struck by a piece of jagged iron from a broken trolley as he sat in a car on his way to the baseball game yesterday. The boy was taken to his home, where the wound was dressed. It only proved a deep cut over the eye.

Three mortgages were taken by the Spokane & Eastern Trust company on three different properties in the last week. A mortgage of \$50,000 on the Cascade building on Riverside avenue near Lincoln street, a \$20,000 mortgage on the Aberdeen hotel at First and Stevens, and one for same amount on the Westminster hotel.

The face of little Monte Ball, 14 years of age, whose left leg was crushed while riding on a Northern Pacific train, lit up with a smile as he found his mother bending over him as he lay awaiting the coming of the ambulance that was to take him to the Sacred Heart hospital.

A new draft of the North Coast and Milwaukee franchises will be ready by Corporation Counsel F. B. Morrill for the committee to consider at its meeting tonight.

A broken rib was sustained by Mrs. George H. Keith when she was struck by a tennis racket handle as she collided with her husband at a tennis game. The rib was set Friday, with no serious result.

The branch of the Japanese Mission of the Methodist Episcopal church at Third avenue and Howard street, is awaiting the arrival of the Rev. Dr. H. B. Johnson, who is expected in Spokane tomorrow from his home in Berkeley, Cal.

More than \$30,000 was subscribed as the First Presbyterian church at the morning and evening services, when the Rev. Dr. Ellis G. Craig, of the McCormick Theological seminary of Chicago, preached the initial sermon.

SPOKANE FLOAT IN PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL PARADE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 6.—Portland's annual celebration, the Rose carnival, began today with the arrival of "Rex Oregonus" at the city at noon.

The festivities, in honor of the rose, will continue until Saturday night, when an illuminated parade through the principal thoroughfares will bring the reign of the carnival king to an end.

It is estimated that 10,000,000 roses will be used to adorn the floats in the various parades that are to be held during the progress of the pageant. In addition, hundreds of thousands of other blossoms will be employed in decorations.

The downtown business blocks and streets are rioting in the carnival colors, rose and green. In the parades, Seattle, Tacoma,

Spokane and other northwest cities will be represented by floats, bands and marching columns.
