NOME, Alaska, June 8.—Decorations day without flowers, without a G. A. R. camp, without a grave, without a body, without sunshine or anything else in particular, but patriotism and snow, and dogs for the marshals' aides.



MEMORIAL DAY AT NOME.

The weirdest Decoration day in all the domains of Uncle Sam was that observed near the Arctic circle in this the capital of Alaska.

There are no flowers in this wilderness of gold and snow; even cordwood is a relic to be treasured. So the Memorial day parade is garlanded with paper wreaths and the three lonely veterans pace the streets with bunches of artificial flowers, made by Eskimo women in the long winter nights, tightly clasped in their hands.

Few are buried in Alaska except dogs and natives. So there are no graves to deck. In fact, an Alaska grave would have to be blasted to enter a body, and if decorated the ground beside would need show-shoes and shovels.

Neither violets nor dust in Nome in May. The veterans, there were six of them two years ago, always march, even though their canes slip in the snow and their ice-crusted beards snap in the river wind.

Some remembers Decoration day, is on the verge of the happy season when the ice sweeps out of the river and when the first boats come in, and the town, that has hibernated through the long, dark zero winter, emerges and bails with wild joy the coming of civilization.
