WIN VICTORY

(By United Press Leased Wire) MERIDA, Yucatan, June 10.—The federal troops dispatched to Yucatan to suppress the rebellious Maya Indians have won a decisive victory near Valladolid, according to dispatches which reached here today. The government soldiers attacked the Indians on the outskirts of Valladolid, the city which the rebels pillaged, killing 40 of its inhabitants. The Indians were driven from trenches they had dug into the hills. They suffered severe losses.

HARMON MAY BE MADE TO WALK THE PLANK

At last C. D. Harmon, superintendent of the crematory department, seems doomed to walk the plank. Harmon is not a bad fellow personally, but he seems to have had considerable difficulty in the last few months in managing his department. He has had the support of the mayor and has thus managed to hang onto his job. Whenever The Press said anything that Mr. Harmon did not like a different version appeared in another paper. Now it seems that things have changed. It is announced that Harmon has allowed the crematory to fall behind in its earnings and that a change of management is needed. The crematory lost \$600 in the last month and Harmon blames this on the increase in the wage scale. A year ago the crematory, under F. P. Weymouth, was making money.

At Coeur d'Alene the issue was urged by a committee consisting of Mrs. Gleason, Mrs. Stalford, Mrs. D. C. Coates, Mrs. Hutton and R. B. Martin. Both trips were made in the private automobile of Mrs. Hutton.

THE KISS IN ALL AGES

The kiss has always been on tap among English-speaking people, and has been heralded in song and story as the seal of affection between lovers. According to tradition it was introduced into England by Princess Rowena, daughter of King Hengist of Frisland. This tradition has it that Rowena was a guest of the English people during the reign of Vortigern. One evening at the close of a banquet given in her honor she arose, and in accordance with the custom among her own people, stepped up to her host, Vortigern, and saluted him with a kiss. The king was astonished, but found the sensation anything but disagreeable. Rowena speedily found many spots in private life among the English people. IN CROMWELL'S TIME. In the time of Oliver Cromwell, when the Puritans were in control of the political situation, kissing was frowned upon as an invention of the devil, and was tabooed by the Puritans even in family life. But at the same time it is related how Oliver Cromwell instructed his envoy at the Swedish court, Ambassador Whitelock, to win over Queen Christina to the cause of the English protectorate. Whitelock tried every scheme he could think of to win the favor of the queen, but seemed unable to make an impression on her. He at length decided to try other tactics, and transferred his attentions for a time from the queen to the female attendants at her court. That meant that he made love to them in the English fashion, and they liked it very much. He also taught them the value of kisses, and he became the most popular man in those parts. THE JUDAS KISS. The Judas kiss has long been the emblem of treachery and dishonor, and alludes to the kiss of Judas before he betrayed the Savior. It is also related that the conspirators, before stabbing Julius Caesar, stopped to kiss his face and to fawn upon him. BOY IS CURED OF LOCKJAW BY INJECTIONS OF MAGNEIUM SULPHATE

(By United Press Leased Wire) PHILADELPHIA, June 10.—John Smith, 12, returned to his home today from the Philadelphia homeopathic hospital, cured of lockjaw, which threatened him with death for two months. The boy was cured by a new method of treatment which was tried for the first time at the hospital here after all hope of saving his life had been given up by other physicians. The new method consists of injections of magnesium sulphate, in conjunction with the anti-toxin treatment. The injections are made in the spinal column to reach the nerve centers. Forty drops of magnesium sulphate were given the boy.

SEATTLE THINKS ROLLER MATCH ON THE SQUARE

SEATTLE, June 10.—"Believe me this match is going to be square, no matter how many frame-ups you may have had before," said Jack Curley yesterday morning to a skeptical newspaperman. Curley seems to have made good, for last night, for the first time in his home town, with the exception of his match with Gotch, Dr. B. F. Roller was vanquished in straight falls. MAKES ESCAPE FROM PRISON

(By United Press Leased Wire) NOGALES, Ariz., June 10.—Louis Fleischner, an American clothing merchant of Nogales, Mexico, is safe on this side of the border today, following a sensational escape from prison at midnight. Fleischner eluded his guard and 25 rurales in charge of Lieutenant Hermosillo, who pursued him. Fleischner was arrested on February 26 on a charge of contraband, but was never brought to trial. It was alleged that he maintained a factory in Nogales, Mexico, which was in reality a blind for smuggling purposes.

TURN DOWN COOPERATIVE STORE PLAN

After a struggle for nearly a year the Farmer's union of the state of Washington has finally put a quietus on the effort of Herb Sharp of Meadow Lake to have the union endorse his co-operative store proposition in Spokane. Sharp was first turned down by the township club of Spokane county, then by the Farmers' union of this district, and he finally took his case before the state meeting of the union at Coeur d'Alene. The Farmers' union has under contemplation the matter of opening or endorsing a mercantile proposition for Spokane, in which it is aimed to sell goods from the manufacturer or wholesaler direct to the consumer, cutting out the middlemen's profit.
