## TODAY IN HISTORY

## A NEW RECOIL DEVICE FOR GUNS

(By United Press Leased Wire) LONDON, June 10.—A recoil device has been perfected today by a local arms company, which will permit the firing of a gun ten consecutive times without magazine injection after each shot. The device consists of extra chambers of patent liquid and air.

Experiments have been made with a 14.3 gun, and the device found to be successful. A report will be submitted to the war office. It is said more accurate shooting can be done with the new gun and the device can be applied to all guns.

# 15,000 ARE HOMELESS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) ST. PETERSBURG, June 10.—Hundreds of inhabitants of Borisov, a Jewish town of 15,000, are camped today in the open fields, following a fire that destroyed 450 homes and caused damage amounting to thousands of dollars.

The governor of the province has ordered the city barracks thrown open to house the homeless. The fire is believed to have been of incendiary origin.

Government officials have been sent to Borisov to investigate.

(By United Press Leased Wire) DENVER, June 10.—The National Mothers congress convened here today in the 14th annual session. Most of the delegates were present when the convention opened and an important session is promised.

Mrs. Fred Schoff, president of the congress, in an interview shortly after her arrival, said:

"I sympathize with the American man, as he provides well for his wife. The fatherhood of the country is in line with the movement of the mother's congress and we are

glad to see that." Speaking of the large death rate among infants, Mrs. Schoff said: "I don't think infant mortality is due to impure milk, as is the theory of many people, but chiefly to the ignorance of mothers."

She denied that club women neglect their children and upheld a declaration made at the recent session of the National Federation of Women's clubs, that club women gave splendid attention and care to their children and are as a whole, fond mothers.
