## WAR SECRETARY IS AT SEATTLE

 SEATTLE, June 25.—Secretary of War Jacob M. Dickinson arrived in Seattle on the Northern Pacific at 10:15 this morning. He was met at the station by his wife, a son, Henry Dickinson of Seattle, whose name he is, and a second son.

The secretary will visit Fort Lawton this afternoon. Asked concerning the removal of the Twenty-fifth (colored) infantry, from the fort, Dickinson said: "The regiment must be kept somewhere. They can't be moved off the earth, and Seattle is as good a place as anywhere."

## MADRIZ ANGRY AT THE U. S.

 SAN JUAN DEL SUR, Nicaragua, June 25.—President Jose Madriz of Nicaragua declared today that the United States had no right to interfere in Nicaraguan affairs, and that if marines had not interfered at Bluefields the city would have been taken and the revolution ended.

This statement was contained in a reply to a note from Secretary of State Knox, demanding the protection of Americans in Nicaragua and incidentally criticizing the Nicaraguan government. Madriz's answer was communicated through the American consul at Managua.

## D. T. HAM IS ELECTED CHAIRMAN

In the organization of today's republican county convention, the standpat wing of the party walked away with the honors by a two to one vote. D. T. Ham was elected chairman over Judge S. A. Mann by a vote of 201 1/2 to 92 1/2.
