

SEEK TO EQUALIZE WATER PRESSURE

Mayor and Others Inspect Allendale --- Find Situation Still Presents Many Difficulties

That the water pressure in the North Hill district is not adequate to maintain a service both for sprinkling and domestic purposes is self-evident. The pressure would be sufficient for ordinary house purposes, but when everyone begins sprinkling about the same hour the strain is too much on the present system, and the sprinkling rules which went into force this morning, allowing pretty free use of the hose may have to be changed again.

In the neighborhood. They found a varying pressure, caused probably by different sized pipes connecting with the mains, but generally found that the people had some water, although they were not satisfied with the amount. Some persons said that it was liable to shut off for an hour or two, with but little or no warning.

The difference in the pressure, as taken by the hydrant gauge, can be noticed in one place, which was inspected yesterday afternoon. One hydrant showed the pressure to be 10 pounds, while, just two blocks away another test showed the pressure to be 30 pounds. The trouble is not so much to get water, as to get the right amount of water at the right time.

CHICAGO HONORS DEAD JUSTICE

(By United Press Leased Wire) CHICAGO, July 8.—With all Chicago courts closed and the Chicago bar doing honor to his memory, the body of Chief Justice Melville W. Fuller of the United States supreme court, was buried in Graceland cemetery today.

Preceding the burial a brief and simple ceremony was held at St. James Episcopal church at which Rev. James E. Freeman officiated. Justices McKenna, White, Holmes, Day and Chief of the supreme court, and Governor Hughes of New York, who has been nominated to the supreme bench, attended the funeral. Most of the judges and well known members of the Chicago bar were present.

A salute of 17 guns was fired over Justice Fuller's body.

MARSHALL WILL BE THE TAIL TO TEDDY COMET IN INDIANA

(By United Press Leased Wire) INDIANAPOLIS, July 8.—There will be a tail to the comet when Colonel Theodore Roosevelt flashes across the Indiana political horizon on a speaking tour in behalf of Senator Beveridge.

Democratic political leaders in Indiana have been awaiting with considerable apprehension the announcement that Bwana Tumbo is to invade Indiana, and for some weeks past have been figuring on plans to counteract the effect of his coming, should he decide to assist Beveridge. As a result it is practically decided that the Roosevelt tour will be followed immediately by a speechmaking round of the state by Governor Marshall, who will plead the cause of John W. Kern, Bryan's last vice presidential running mate and the man who aspires to Beveridge's toga.

To an outsider this may sound like attacking a battleship with bow and arrows, but to Hoosiers it is a different matter. Marshall was forced into the governor's chair against his own wishes by the Indiana democratic machine, which was in desperate need of a compromise candidate. Marshall responded by ignoring and almost disrupting the Indiana democracy machine and giving the state a splendid nonpartisan administration.

(By United Press Leased Wire) WASHINGTON, July 8.—Politics, dotted her and there with "T. R." are rioting through the national capital today, following the announcement that Colonel Roosevelt will journey to Indiana to make a political speech that will be an endorsement of Senator Albert J. Beveridge.

The buzz of comment which started when it was reported that Roosevelt would endorse the senatorial candidacy of Congressman Poindexter of Washington had hardly subsided, following the strenuous denial from Sagamore Hill, when the new announcement from the same place reagitated the situation.

The proposed endorsement put several more squarely in line with the insurgents than any action he has taken since the "return from Elba," according to the interpretation of the progressive leaders.

The accident occurred while the tot was alone in the yard of her home and the first her parents knew of the accident was when they saw her dress suddenly burst in flames. Dr. E. R. The physicians say that her eyes will not be any the worse for the experience, as she seems to have closed them involuntarily to escape the flames.

MAY CALL SPECIAL SESSION OF CONGRESS TO CONFIRM THE NEW CHIEF JUSTICE

(By United Press Leased Wire) BEVERLY, Mass., July 8.—That the senate may be called in special session to confirm the nomination of a new chief justice of the supreme court to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Melville W. Fuller, is rumored here today. The report declares that President Taft is considering the action that the court may hear the tobacco and oil trust cases without further delay. No official statement regarding the matter has been made and many persons here doubt the authenticity of the report. They declare that a special session would cost \$60,000 and believe that the president would not put the country to such an expense unless some more urgent need presented itself.
