The state of New York received from the Harriman, Rogers and Kennedy estate taxes amounting to the enormous total of \$2,176,000.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Edward H. Harriman was worth \$71,053,707 when he died on September 9, 1909. Wall street and the general public have made estimates of the amount of the Harriman estate that ranged from \$100,000,000 to twice as much, but few even of his most intimate friends believed that his estate would fall below \$80,000,000.

FIRE DESTROYS LUMBER PLANT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 2.—"I'm being as brave as I can, but my chorus days are over. I wonder what I shall do now to make my living."

Less than three hours after surgeons had amputated both her limbs, one at the thigh, the other above the ankle, Miss Marjorie Mahr, a chorus girl who played at a local theater, began planning on how she could make her way along with such a handicap.

A few hours before three of her horrified friends had pulled her lacerated body from beneath the trucks of a passenger train, that had run her down on a trestle on the outskirts of Portland.

Although she suffered intensely, the 19 year old girl never whimpered. When the physicians placed her on the operating table, she begged them not to amputate her crushed foot.

"Don't cut that off, too! she said. "I can make a living with that—maybe!" But to save her life, the surgeons were compelled to turn a deaf ear.

At the Good Samaritan hospital, where the girl is now rapidly recovering, doctors and nurses declare that "she is the gamest little girl on earth."

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—The patrons of Salvatore Salano, a barber of Newaik, N. J., who noticed that the barber's new assistant was smooth of hand and feminine in manner, were enlightened yesterday when it was disclosed in the second criminal court that the supposed youth was a young woman of 21, who had been masquerading under circumstances that were not of her own creation.

It was Policeman Kaas who made the discovery that "Jimmie," the barber's assistant, was a girl, although her hair was cut short and she wore male attire. Kaas' investigations led to the appearance yesterday before Judge Yuill of Salano, Albert Rosso, who keeps another barber shop, and "Jimmie," who confessed to the court that her real name was Mary De Marco and her home was in Irvington. She said she was introduced by Salano, whose sweetheart she was to Rosso several weeks ago. July 10 she went to an apartment in Hifton with Rosso and drank several glasses of beer. The next morning she awoke in Rosso's shop to find her hair had been shorn off close and she was dressed in boy's clothing.
