POTLATCH, IDAHO, AUG. 24.—A heavy fire is burning in the underbrush, seven miles from Potlatch, and 300 men from the Potlatch Lumber company are fighting the flames. The heavy green timber is in no immediate danger.

CLAYTON IS SAFE. CLAYTON, Wash., Aug. 24.—The town of Clayton is safe. The big forest fire which has been raging the last 24 hours two miles from town near Loon lake, has practically burned out. NORTHERN PACIFIC AND GREAT NORTHERN ROADS FRAMED UP SEIZURE OF CONSERVATION CONGRESS

Governor Hay Lets Cat Out of the Bag by Admitting That President Hill and President Elliott Wrote Him That Great St. Paul Convention Was a Scheme Against Western States—Secret of Governors' Conference at Salt Lake is Out—Wall Street on the Scene in a Sheep's Coat.

BY W. G. SHEPHERD. SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 24.—The great secret of the conservation congress is out. They couldn't keep it long enough to fool Mr. American Citizen, but they had Mr. Citizen scratching his head a good deal lately about the things he'd heard in advance about the St. Paul meeting.
